**CANADIANS AT
THE OLYMPIC**

Lieutenant Wood Leonard Writes
Interesting Letter From
England.

HORSES IN GOOD SHAPE

Jumping for the Adam Beck Cup
Took Place Yesterday—
Some Results.

An interesting letter on the Olympic Horse Show has been received from Lieut. Wood Leonard, one of the Canadian team riding in England at this show.

It was written just prior to the commencement of the exhibition, and gives some interesting details. The Canadians were privileged to spend part of a day in Havre, France, where they saw large numbers of French soldiers.

"They may be able to fight well," was Lieut. Wood Leonard's comment, "but they certainly do not make a smart appearance."

The First Day.

On arriving in London, they unshipped, and had their horses quartered near the Olympic. The first day of their arrival they attended the military and naval performances, and saw the Queen and several of the princes.

The Canadian team reported at the war office on June 2, and an officer was detailed to look after their comfort.

Horses in Good Shape.

The horses arrived in good shape, but were somewhat soft, and shortly after that the Canadians came to the conclusion that they would scarcely win the King's Cup owing to the fact that their horses were soft, and the competition of the very keenest.

"We will do our best, but we do not expect to win," he comments. "The horses have had not sufficient time to get their land legs after the voyage. The other teams are in Brussels attending a similar competition, and they will be in great form when the competition is announced."

Pick Italians to Win.

"The consensus of opinion is that the Italian team, all of whom are splendid riders, will win the King Edward Cup."

"We were the first foreign team to arrive, because, as I said, the others are at Brussels attending the show there. Our horses were quartered at the Olympic on June 2. We are not allowed to practice there, however, but must ride two miles to the Light Guards' school for practice."

The French Team.

A later letter states that the French team, which eventually proved to be the winners of the cup, were quartered at the war office with them.

He speaks of the Argentine team, which had also arrived at this time, as dashing riders, and a team that he

expected to do well in the competition. The Canadians have a lot of work to do. They must attend morning, afternoon and evening, and with the exacting work on their horses it is no wonder that, with only a little more than a week on land, they did not expect to win the cup.

The Canadian officers are being royally entertained, by the British officers, but have declined to accept all the invitations until after the competitions are over.

Thursday at the Show.

London, June 10.—The programme today at the International Horse Show at Olympia held many interesting events, including the important jumping competition for the Canadian cup, presented by Adam Beck.

C. W. Watson, of Baltimore, started the day well by taking first honors, and the Berkeley challenge cup in class 49, four-in-hands, exceeding 15 hands, 11 teams entered, with fur spanking bays. Judge William H. Moore, of New York, received fifth prize in this event.

Watson was again first in class 55, judging of 22 single harness horses, over 14 and not exceeding 15 hands shown to a two-wheel carriage, with Ringing Bells, who easily overshadowed his competitors. Judge Moore was given three awards in this class. His horse was placed in reserve, and Lonsdale was commended.

**DROPS DEAD AT
JUDGE'S STAND**

Frank Gill, After Finishing Second in Third Gravesend Race, Collapses.

Gravesend, N.Y., June 10.—Frank Gill, a chestnut horse, fell dead, probably from the bursting of a blood vessel, after finishing second in the third race at Gravesend today. He was a heavily played favorite at 1 to 2. He lay in second place all the way of the mile and a furlong journey.

When Seville, his rider, pulled up on the lower turn, he felt the horse giving way under him, and jumped off just as Frank Gill dropped dead. Frank Gill was in the stud at a Kentucky farm for a season and was off form for a season, and was brought east this year to race, but has shown nothing like the form he displayed as a 3-year-old when he defeated Peter Pan. He was 5 years old, by Collar-Ravello II.

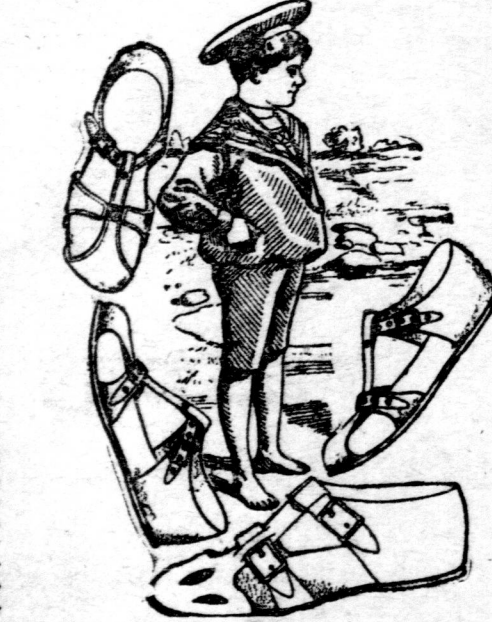
