

# THE ANTI-BUDGET PEERS

## OWN 10,376,995 ACRES

282 of Them Interested in Land--The Liquor Trade--A Correct List Compiled by The London Daily News--Why They Threw Out the Budget.

Three hundred and fifty peers slew the people's budget, says the London Daily News. The people must remember in the coming struggle who these peers are and what they own. The following exhaustive list, specially compiled from various official documents, shows that 282 of these peers are financially interested in the liquor trade or have vast landed possessions while many of them are great liquor lords as well as great landlords.

Let us first examine the landed interests of the men who gave the budget its deathblow, as shown in the following table:

A few landless peers who voted against the budget are, of course, not included in the list.

This list is a wonderful commentary on the action of the anti-budget peers. It not only reveals the preponderant influence of the liquor and landlords in the historic debate on the budget, but it proves that nearly a fourth of our hereditary legislators are inseparably associated with the "trade."

Lord Iveagh, who owns considerably over a million shares in the famous firm of which he is chairman, is the premier liquor lord. He is probably the largest owner of brewery shares either in or out of the House of Lords.

Much care has been exercised in verifying these figures from the share lists of brewery companies and from other official sources.

The peers interested, either directly or indirectly, in brewery, distillery, or wine and spirit companies, and the peers with vast landed possessions amounting to over ten million acres, who recorded their votes against the budget are given below, the names marked with a star (\*) being those of shareholders, directors, and trustees in distilling and brewing companies:
