### **NEW HAY AT** HIGH WATER MARK

Some Choice Loads Sold on the Market Today at \$15.50 a Ton.

OLD OATS SNAPPED UP

New hay reached the high-water mark of this season on the local market this morning. Three choice loads sold quickly at \$15 50 per ton.

Old oats varied from \$1 35 to \$1 38 per hundredweight, and were readily disposed of at that high figure. Notwithstanding that the heavy rains throughout the townships last night tied up the harvesting operations of the farmers, thus giving them spare time to market their produce, the market was comparatively small in size.
