The unholy alliance between American trusts and the anti-reciprocity organization in Canada, is exposed in the latest canard of the London Free Press. The Advertiser caught the Free Press at once before it had closed its hps, so to speak, on these untruths. As to No. 1, the Free Press was cornered and forced to disclose the truth that the so-called "Journal" is not a "newspaper" at all, but a semi-monthly periodical, the official organ of the United States Lumber Trust. It is published in more than one city, and issues a Wilmington edition. We quote its title from the Free Press of today:

Today, without acknowledging its first error, it prints a facsimile of the title-page of its friend "The Journal" in a panicky haste to reassure its readers that there actually is such a "newspaper," but leaves no doubt now in any one's mind that the "Journal" is not a newspaper, but an official organ of the American Lumber Trust.

As to falsehood No. 2, its exposure of course follows necessarily upon that of falsehood No. 1. Once it is clear that the American Lumber Trust is behind the Free Press' "Wilmington Journal," it is also clear that such a publication cannot be in favor of reciprocity. The Advertiser, however, telegraphed to the leading newspaper of Wilmington, the Daily Star, for decisive information on this point, and received the reply photographed above.

Now, what are decent Canadians to think of the annexation talk of an Amercan anti-reciprocity organ, and of the Canadian papers which reprint it?

The facts of this case are clear. The American Lumber Trust inspired purposely for the Canadian elections the article quoted by the Free Press. It was sent to the anti-reciprocity headquarters or bureau in this country at Ottawa, there reprinted, or facsimiled by the gross, and distributed to such papers, including the Free Press, as do not mind using it, with instructions to parade the "Wilmington Journal" as an ordinary American news-
