Democrats' Sweep.

Democratic governors were elected yesterday in each state where this offilled-Massachusetts, New Jersey and Virginia-and with the exception of New York State, where the Tammany Democracy was severely rebuked, more Democratic than Republican victories were recorded at

Maryland elected a Democratic United States senator, Blair Lee, and of the four congressmen elected, three Democrats. The exception was C. D. Page, in the third district, Massachusetts.

In Massachusetts there was a Democratic landslide. Lieutenant-Governor David Walsh was chosen governor of the state by a plurality of 53,691, the largest ever given a Democratic candidate for the office.

Mr. Walsh carried with him into of fice every Democratic candidate on the state ticket, with the possible exception of the attorney-general.

Dignitary Claims Michigan Central and Pere Marquette Crumbled Before Him.

Mayor C. M. R. Graham returned from Detroit this morning. To The Advertiser he announced that after a conference with Michigan Central and Pere Marquette officials, the P. M. would this week submit a proposal in writing for the rental of the London and Port Stanley Railway from the expiration of its present lease until such time as the electrification construction work is completed. Would Rebuild Road?

The mayor declared that both roads were willing to rehabilitate the roadbed of the road at cost price. This, he claimed, would relieve the city of any responsibility in maintenance of way during the rehabilitation proceedings He asserted that Chairman H. B. Ledyard, of the Michigan Central board of directors, had given his personal assurance that if the Pere Marquette road would not operate the road in the interim, that the M. C. R. would, and that further the M. C. R. would be prepared to construct the new road-

Not Borne Out by Facts. The mayor's statements are at wariance with the latest word received in this city from Manager Ledyard, who, according to the mayor, is apparently falling over himself in his effort to build the London and Port Stanley at cost price for the city, and to operate over the line when electrified.

# RILEY'S DEFENCE

Write to The Advertiser Telling of Young Man's Past Life.

HAD TO LEAVE SCHOOL

He Has Always Helped Mother, Who Is Very Poor-Attorney Engaged.

A communication has reached The Advertiser from parties in Missouri, bearing on the early life of Thomas Riley, the young American charged

with murdering George Blackburn. It comes from persons interested in the plight of the young man, and states that Riley is the son of very poor people at Everton, a small town of about 600 persons, in the southwest part of Missouri. His father died some years ago, and later his mother married a poor man, who for a number of years has been section foreman, working out of the little town.

Had to Leave School.

The letter says that Riley has been a hard-working young fellow from the time he was able to shoulder a pick, after leaving school of necessity, and for several years he worked on the railroad, and his mother says that he has always helped to support the family, in which there are several younger children.

Riley is, of course, well known at Everton, and the news that he had killed someone came as a distinct shock to everyone there. If he ever had an altereation or difficulty in his life, none of the businessmen, nor, in fact, anyone else, knew of it. He had always been a favorite among those with whom he associated, according to the information received.

Not a Drinking Man. Referring to Riley's habits, the letter says: "He was never known here as a drinking man, and, in fact, it is not known, except to a few of his very intimate friends, that he ever drinks anything, and the possibility of his being an intentional murderer is so incompatible with every idea and impression of his make-up, as entertained by those who have always known him, that it seems utterly impossible

he is guilty to all of his friends." Riley is understood to have been & member of a lodge at Everton, which has interested itself in his behalf, and an attorney to act in co-operation with the counsel in London, has been en-

Would Be Good Citizen.

Riley's unfortunate case continues to attract discussion in the city. An officer of the crown was recently heard by an Advertiser reporter to say that there was no doubt that if Riley were released he would become a good citizen, but that the law has little to say for liquor in extenuation of

Wherever there are discussions of the case, the question arises, "Was it Tom Riley or John Barleycorn that killed George Blackburn?"

Whatever the character of the man in prison, there are few who contend that he would have committed the crime alleged had it not been for the fact that he had been drinking whiskey or other kind of liquor. Whiskey a Partner.

John Barleycorn was a partner in this crime, as he has been a partner in so many others. Yet John Barleycorn may lick his fangs with delight and stand in the wings of the sanguinary stage he has set, and th recognize him as an accessory, because he has no tangibility. They

can't get HIM. Riley's defence will no doubt have to do with his condition at the time of the shooting. It is understood that he will be properly represented when his trial commences.

Riley has been worrying considerably in prison since his arrest. He is not able to sleep at nights frequently, and his hair is tinged with gray.

### WILL PRESERVE LATCH HIS GRANDFATHER MADE

Constable Gumb To Get Contriva ance That Has Clicked Behind Thousands of Prisoners.

High Constable Gumb hopes shortly to be in possession of a souvenir of the old house, which will be of great interest to him. Seventy-five years ago, his grandfather, the late John Gumb, & blacksmith, famed as much for his physe ical size and strength as for the excellence of his work, was given the contract of "Ironing" the county jail. He made most of the locks, bolts and bars which, even to the present time, insure the safe-keeping of the prisoners.

The big door leading from the court

house to the jail, is to be taken down in the course of the alterations, and Sheriff Cameron has issued instructions that the big iron latch is to be preserved and presented to the High Constable as souvenir. The latch is in as good repair today as it was 75 years ago, when was first installed.
