

SENT TO TRIAL ON CHARGE OF INTENT TO ROB

Jack Bannon, Wealthy Windsor Real Estate Man, Faces Serious Allegation.

MAGISTRATE GUNDY ACTS

WINDSOR, Dec. 8.—"Although finding little corroborative evidence," he said, Magistrate Gundy this afternoon in police court sent Basil "Jack" Bannon, wealthy real estate operator, to trial on a charge of conspiring to rob the government liquor warehouse, where more than \$250,000 worth of liquor was stored.

Bannon also is charged with plotting with a gang of Detroit gunmen to raid the home of Mrs. Louisa Trumble, widow of the late Beverly Trumble, slain by

Rev. Spracklin. He was released on bail of \$5,000 to appear for trial in the Trumble case Saturday or early next week. Testifying for the crown, Clay Howery, 36 years old, of Seneca avenue, Detroit, confessed gunman, told the court that he was one of a gang of six gunmen that attempted to raid the liquor warehouse on the afternoon of Sept. 25. The robbery was frustrated, he said, by the vigilance of the watchman.

Were Well Armed.

"Bannon told me that the only job he had for the gang was to take the government warehouse," was the startling answer given by Howery to a question of Crown Attorney Urquhart. When the attempt was made to rob the warehouse we were all armed with 45 calibre automatics. And we would have used them had the watchmen started firing. Howery and the other members of his gang, known to border police as "river pirates," were arrested at River-side four weeks ago. He was arraigned on a charge of carrying concealed weapons, Magistrate Gundy suspending sentence.

CHARGED WITH SUBORNATION OF WITNESSES

Trial of Roy Scott and Frank Proctor Opens Tuesday.

15 CRIMINAL CASES

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 8.—Fifteen cases, ten of which are criminal, are listed for trial at the general sessions of the county court which opens at the court house Tuesday next.

Three of the criminal cases are against one man, namely, Orie Hoshal of Port Stanley, who is at present serving time in the county jail on a charge of selling liquor illegally. Hoshal is charged with burning an automobile to collect the insurance and with having perjured himself on making application for the insurance. He will be tried on charges of arson, attempted fraud and fraud.

Roy Scott and Frank Proctor, both of this city await trial on a charge of subornation of witnesses. Following a police court action last spring, at which he gave evidence, Cecil Scram of this city informed the police that Scott and Proctor had persuaded him to commit perjury in order that they might go free.

The other criminal cases are: Rex versus F. Mathews of Bayham Township, charged with assault causing bodily harm; Rex versus Grey, a serious charge; Rex versus Magorja, housebreaking; and Rex versus Joe Snovsky, robbery. Snovsky is a resident in the east end of the city, and is alleged to have robbed one of his countrymen, Magorja, a Russian, who formerly resided in East Talbot. His case has been called and adjourned four or five times during the last two years on account of the defendant's non-appearance in court. Two hundred dollars cash bail is held by the crown.

Five Civil Actions.

Two of the civil cases are jury actions, while the other three are non-jury. The first case on the docket is that of William and Morley Pollock versus Cecil Marlatt, lumbermen, of Staffordville. The plaintiffs claim the sum of \$707.17 which they say is due them from the defendants.

A collision of two automobiles on the night of Oct. 31 on the Talbot road is responsible for the second case, Hugh A. Brown of Aylmer is suing for \$400 and costs from Burton Beers of Southwold, which he claims for damages resulting from alleged negligent driving on the part of the defendant. Beers has entered a counter-claim for damages amounting to \$200.

Frances Harvey of Yarmouth, passenger in an automobile wrecked near Dutton on Aug. 21, is suing the County of Elgin and the Township of Dunwich for the sum of \$1,000 for injuries received to her neck, shoulder and spine. The car in which she was riding left the roadway and tumbled over a steep embankment. She claims that the roadway was unsafe for traffic.

The third non-jury case is over an ice bill for the sum of \$224.50 with In-place of Judge O. C. Ermantinger, who Company of Aylmer as plaintiffs, and Thomas Whitloughby as defendant. It is likely that Judge Coughlin of Sandwich will preside over the court in place of Judge O. C. Ermantinger, who is ill in the hospital.

SCORES INJURED IN CHICAGO RIOTS

Police Battle Striking Packing Plant Employees With Rifles.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—Chicago's stockyards district today was the scene of another series of outbreaks, which at times approached the riot stage, as the result of the strike of packing plant employees, which has been in effect in all of the country's chief packing centers for four days.

One man was shot, scores were injured, police engaged in pistol and rifle fights with strike sympathizers and dozens of men and women were arrested as a result of today's disorders, which occurred as the workers were leaving the local plants.

In other cities the situation was reported quiet.

The outbreaks here came within a few hours after Judge Denis Sullivan had issued a temporary injunction restraining the strikers from picketing, but despite this order several thousand men gathered around the plants just before the closing whistle.

At the Armour Glue Company about two thousand men began hurling bricks and stones at the workers as they left the plant. Almost simultaneously, disorders broke out at half a dozen other points, and within a short time the whole packing district seemed to be in disorder.

Women played an important part, forming in crowds which blocked the traffic and hindered the police. One crowd of 250, led by a grey-haired woman, was charged repeatedly by mounted police before it was disbanded.

ALL READY FOR FOCH'S RECEPTION

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—Arrangements were completed today for the public reception to Marshal Foch, generalissimo of the Allied armies in the great war, and General John Pershing, commander-in-chief of the American expeditionary forces, both of whom will arrive in the capital Sunday morning, accompanied by their staffs.

Marshal Foch and General Pershing will be officially welcomed to Canada, Ottawa being the first point they will visit in the Dominion.

They will be met by His Excellency Lord Byng of Vimy, governor-general of Canada, and a military reception will follow.

During his Canadian tour Marshal Foch will enjoy the use of the private car of Charles M. Schwab, the steel magnate.

EXPECT BIG LOSS IN MONTREAL FIRE

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—Fire which broke out at 7:30 this evening in the Roman Catholic Boys' Reformatory, in the central east end of the city, was burning fiercely at 9 p.m. None of the inmates had retired for the night, and no loss of life is anticipated. It is expected the damage will be considerable.

DEFEATED TWICE DURING 40 YEARS

St. Thomas Alderman Misses But One Council Meeting.

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 8.—For the first time in 40 years Ald. Patrick Meehan, the "daddy" of the city fathers, missed a meeting of the city council on Thursday night when, through illness, he was confined to his home. Mr. Meehan has been an alderman in this city almost continually during that period, having suffered defeat at the polls only twice, according to his fellow-members. None of them could recall when he was absent from his seat on any former occasion when roll was called.

During the third annual banquet and smoker of the United Veterans' organization in the Shriners' Hall, Wednesday night, ex-Mayor E. A. Horton announced that he would donate a cup for competition among city football teams next year.

A fund towards the erection of a parish hall for St. John's Church of this city was begun by the Ladies' Aid of that congregation at its regular monthly meeting held this week.

When a most successful dance was held under the auspices of the International Brotherhood of Blacksmiths, Forge Droppers and Helpers, in the G. W. V. A. Hall, Dec. 5, the sum of \$140 was raised in aid of the Barnardo Home for Boys, as was announced Thursday night. The money had been forwarded to the home by the committee in charge.

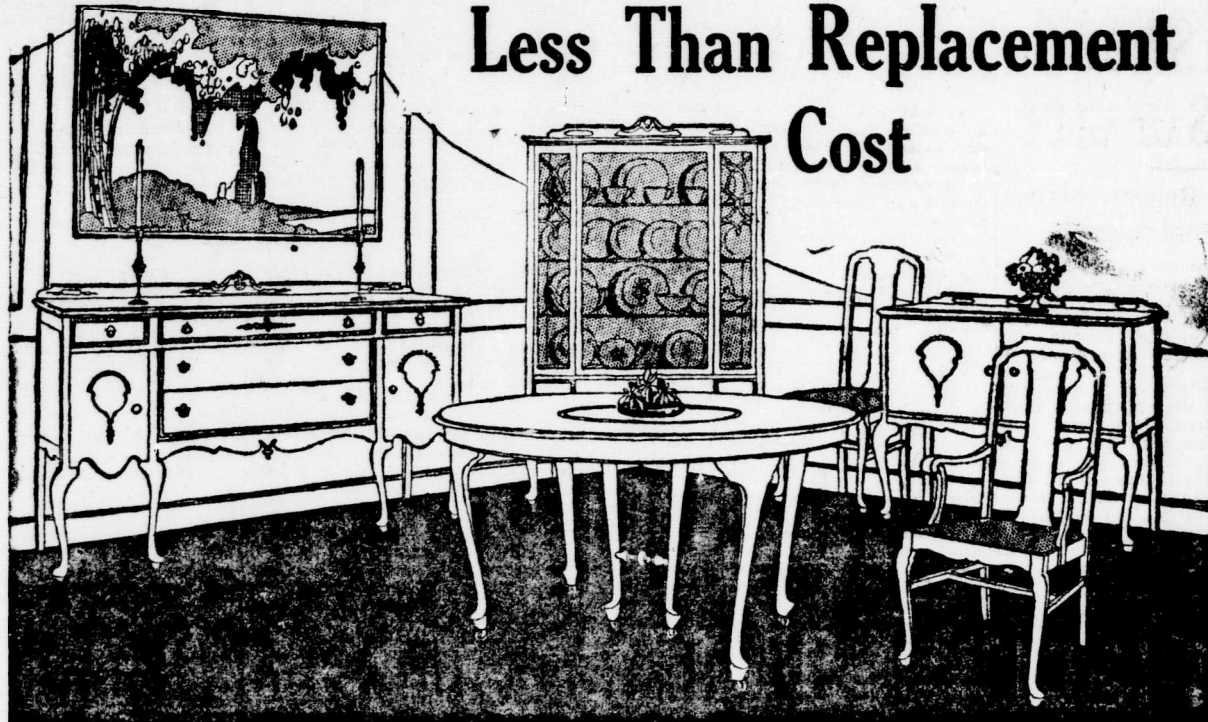

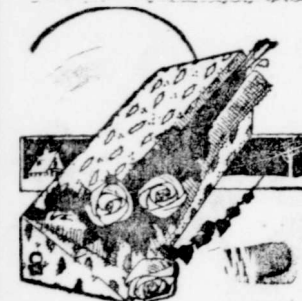
