Incendiaries attempted to destroy the London Labor Temple on Dundas street late this morning firemen were told when they were called to the building to extinguish a fire which had started in the basement.

Although only about \$15 damage was done by the blaze, which started in a pile of oily waste, the entire building would probably have been in flames within a short time if occupants of the building had not been warned by the smoke, for close to the owned by the Wright Lithographing

Those who discovered the fire and turned in the alarm believe the oilsoaked rags were placed in the base ment only recently.


