

CONVINCED IRISH REPUBLICANS TO TRIUMPH IN END

Miss Mary MacSwiney States Arrests at Worst Only Temporary Setback.

LOST VALUABLE MEN

Declares Plenty Available To Take Place of Captured Rebels.

BRAYDEN, Special Cable to The London Advertiser and Chicago Daily News, Copyright, Dublin, March 15.—Republicans here regard the arrests of their sympathizers in Great Britain at its worst a temporary setback. The writer found Mary MacSwiney at the Republican offices which are still open in Dublin, convinced of an ultimate republican triumph and believing that the government had seized some valuable men in England, but that nine-tenths of those arrested were unknown to her, and she believed many of the important leaders had escaped. Great Britain was not the only place from which military supplies could come.

It was evident that Miss MacSwiney did not realize the effect of the Free State's increased stringency of fighting men, but said that there were always plenty who were ready to replace them and that the day when their leaders would be exhausted was far away.

Also Republican, Mrs. O'Callaghan, also a Republican member of the Dail, whose husband, the mayor of Limerick, was murdered by Black and Tans, joined in the conversation with Miss MacSwiney and assured the correspondent that the feeling in the country was unfavorable to the government and uninfluenced by its propaganda. Both women were interested in the effect of the arrest on opinion. They pointed out that the arrests were made by authority of a British statute originally directed against all Republicans, including the present Free State Government. Free State opinion, however, takes the arrests as evidence of the government's determination to suppress the armed revolt regardless of all Republican difficulties.

Not Approved. But the government's stiffness is not universally approved. The ministers have been steadily criticised by the old Unionists, who have accepted the Free State and endorsed their policy, but the Irish Times, the chief newspaper of this section, criticizes their rejection of peace proposals and says:

"We suggest that the government can help to develop an atmosphere of peace for Monsignor Linn, the Papal envoy, by being less suspicious of the motives of the native peace-makers and less determined to exchange with the Republican leaders. If neutral Irish are really working for peace, Kevin O'Higgins' sarcasm is inexcusable. The ministerial statements which seem with personalities are not likely to induce a single rebel to lay down his arms."

The government publishes more of the captured correspondence of Eamonn De Valera, the principal point of which is his failure to raise funds in Ireland and his depression at the state of his movement in the United States. The newspapers feature these revelations, but according to Mrs. O'Callaghan, the Republicans in Ireland ignore the captured correspondence and she discounts the effect of the letters on general opinion. Nevertheless the writer believes they are producing the impression that De Valera is at the end of his tether.

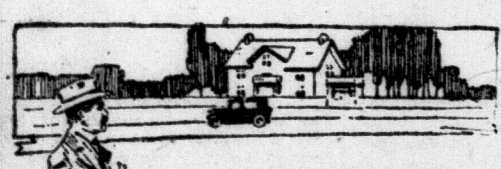
The funeral will be held from the above address on Saturday, and interment will be made in Woodland Cemetery.

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LABOR IS OPPOSED TO REGISTRATION UNDER UNION ACT

Tom Moore Differs With A. R. Moshier on Proposed Action.

WILL NOT BE FORCED

Labor Head Refuses To Be Coerced by Decision of Justice Galt.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, March 15.—"Organized labor is definitely opposed to registration under the trade union act as suggested by A. R. Moshier, grand president C. B. of R. E., and does not intend to be stampeded into changing its attitude and accepting incorporation of trade unions, with all that they may involve, simply because of one decision of the nature of that rendered by Mr. Justice Galt," declared Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, last night in discussion of the decision of Judge Galt.

He referred to Mr. Moshier's claim, that the success of brotherhood was due to its having a legal status through registration under the Canadian trade union act and maintained that had congress likewise registered the case of the C. 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MOVE TO LOCATE JUVENILE COURT IN THE CITY HALL

Plan to Disassociate It From All Other Courts of the Municipality.

DELAY THREE WEEKS

New Institution Will Not Be Put Into Operation Until Officially Confirmed.

Efforts will be made to locate the juvenile court of this city which is in the course of organization, in the city hall, it was learned today from authentic sources.

Those who are behind the movement and in whose hands the matter of quarters rest, desire to secure a location that will be dissociated with all other courts of this city. In this respects it is felt rooms in the city hall would prove ideal.

When it was believed last year that Magistrate Graydon was to receive the appointment of juvenile court judge, the city council secured a lease on quarters over a building three or four doors from the police station on Carling street. Although the present council still holds a lease on the building, it is not likely that the rooms will be utilized.

The rooms in question were chosen because the authorities believed they would be convenient for Magistrate Graydon because of their proximity to the police court. This angle need not be considered now that Rev. Quintin Warner has received the appointment, although it is still possible that the rooms will be used if more suitable ones cannot be secured.

It is pointed out that visiting an inmate in the city hall would leave a stigma attached to a girl or boy. It is feared that this would occur if the court were near the police station even though in a different building.

The court will not be in operation for another three weeks at least as the appointment of judge still awaits official confirmation and the act has yet to be proclaimed by the department at Ottawa.

CHILEAN CABINET RESIGNS AFTER BRIEF EXISTENCE

Associated Press Despatch. Santiago, Chile, March 15.—The Chilean cabinet resigned last night.

The Chilean Senate on March 7 refused to vote of confidence to the ministry of Francisco Garcia Gana, but the Chamber of Deputies on the same day sustained the resignation. The resignation of the cabinet was then held in abeyance by President Alessandri, who asserted that only about half of the senators were present at the session which refused the vote. The ministry was formed on Jan. 10.

SASKATCHEWAN'S POLICY ON LIQUOR TO REMAIN

Canadian Press Despatch. Regina, Sask., March 15.—There will be no change for the present in the Saskatchewan government's liquor policy, it was announced by Hon. J. A. Cross, attorney-general in the Saskatchewan assembly, last yesterday.

The government will not comply with the moderate league petition, signed by 65,075 residents of the province, asking for government control and sale of liquor for beverage purposes, and the retail sale of beer.

Claims 18 Hours As Dance Record

Former Aviator Resorts to Succession of Partners.

London, March 15.—The latest claimant to marathon dancing honors is Santos Susani, a former aviator, who says he beat the world's record with a continuous performance lasting 18 hours and 34 minutes. During this time, Susani did 434 fast dances, with a succession of partners. The first young lady lasted 13 hours.

BANDITS ROB HOSPITAL, USE STUPEFYING FUMES

Whole Staff Overcome Thieves Take Even Beds and Mattresses.

Associated Press Despatch. Naples, March 15.—The daring robbery of a private hospital, carried out with the aid of stupefying fumes from a powder thrown into an open fireplace, occurred at Aversa, near here, today.

Dr. Mastrocchio, proprietor of an eye clinic, had summoned the whole hospital staff and the patients into one room for administration, when one of his servants suddenly threw some powder into the fire and then dashed out of the room, locking the door on the outside. The powder gave off dense fumes, and before the doctor and his assistants could break down the door or open the windows everyone in the room was overcome by the fumes.

When consciousness returned to the victims several hours later they found the clinic premises completely rifled, all the instruments and furniture, even the beds and mattresses, having been removed in a cart by the robber and his accomplices.

SCOTCH DISTILLERIES ARE NOT IN SYNDICATE

Have No Connection With the Alleged Combine Shipping to the United States.

London, March 15.—With regard to a rumor in circulation in the Scotch whisky trade, that a powerful syndicate has been formed to run huge cargoes of whiskey to the United States, employing thirty ships in the work, a despatch to the Westminster Gazette from Edinburgh says the syndicate allegedly has placed an initial order for 100,000 cases of whiskey.

The despatch adds, however, that careful inquiry leads to the conclusion that such an amount of good whiskey is not available for the United States, as fine, matured whiskey is scarce and that the big firms are conserving their supplies for established domestic and overseas markets.

The correspondent says also that inquiry shows none of the big distilleries in Scotland is interested in the alleged syndicate.
