CONVINCED IRISH REPUBLICANS TO TRIUMPH IN END

Miss Mary MacSwiney States Arrests at Worst Only Temporary Setback.

LOST VALUABLE MEN

Declares Plenty Available To Take Place of Captured Rebels.

Special Cable to The London Advertise and Chicago Daily News. Copyright. Dublin, March 15.—Republican here regard the arrests of their sympathizers in Great Britain at its worst a temporary setback. The writer found Mary MacSweney at the Republican offices which are still open in Dublin, convinced of an ultimate republican triumph. She admitted that the government had seized some valuable men in England, but that nine-tenths of those arrested were unknown to her, and she believed many of the important leaders had escaped. Great Britain was not the only place from which military supplies could come

It was evident that Miss Mac-Sweney did not realize the effect of the Free State's increased stringency and the fact that the importation of arms is becoming more difficult daily. She recognized the loss of the Republicans from the frequent captures of fighting men, but said that there were always plenty who were ready to replace them and that the day when their leaders would be exhausted was far away.

Mrs. O'Callaghan, also a Repubmurdered by Black and Tans, joined in the conversation with Miss Mac-Sweney and assured the correspondent that the feeling in the country was unfavorable to the government and uninfluenced by its propaganda. Both women were interested in the effect of the arrest on opinion. They pointed out that the arrests were made by authority of a British statute originally directed against all Republicans, including the present Free State ministers, and its application at the invitation of the Free State confirmed their contention that the Irish are now regarded as British subjects. They expect that this will influence Republicans who have adnered to the Free State.

Among Labor leaders and others a similar impression prevails that the arrests were a bad blunder, very undesirable from an Irish constituional point of view and likely to weaken the government. Free State opinion; however, takes the arrests as evidence of the government's de-termination to suppress the armed revolt regardless of all Republican dialetics.

Not Approved.

But the government's stiffness is not universally approved. The min-isters have been steadily supported by the old Unionists, who have accepted the Free State and indorsed their policy, but the Irish Times, the chief newspaper of this section, criti-cizes heir rejection of peace pro-

posals and says:
"We suggest that the government can help to develop an atmosphere of peace for Monsignor Linzio, the Papal envoy, by being less suspicious of the motives of the native peacemakers and less acrimonious in the wordy exchanges with the Republican If neutral Irish are realiy working for peace, Kevin O'Higgins' sarcasm is not likely to encourage them. Ministerial statements which teem with personalities are not likely to induce a single rebel to lay down his arms.

The government publishes more of the captured correspondence of Eamonn De Valera, the principal point of which is his failure to raise funds in Ireland and his depression it the state of his movement in the United States. The newspapers feature these revelations, but, according to Mrs. O'Callaghan, the Republicans in Ireland ignore the cap-tured correspondence and she discounts the effect of the letters on general opinion. Nevertheless the writer believes they are producing the impression that De Valera is at the end of his tether.


