POSTPONES SENTENCE FOR NEGLIGENT DRIVING

Norman Grover in Court as a
Result of Truck Crashing
Through Window.

After hearing the evidence in the
case against Norman Grover, a truck
driver, charged with driving in a
negligent manner owing to defective
brakes, Deputy Magistrate Gladman
did not impose any sentence, but said
he would leave it till the morning in
order to consider the case.

Although no evidence of negligent
driving was brought out, Grover ad-
mitted that his brakes had not been
working. On Monday last he had
parked his car on Dundas street, and
in order to hold it in position had
left it in gear. The emergency brake
would not hold. When he cranked
the car, forgetting it was in gear, it
had moved forward and crashed
through a store window before he
could stop it. An officer testified as
to testing the brakes.

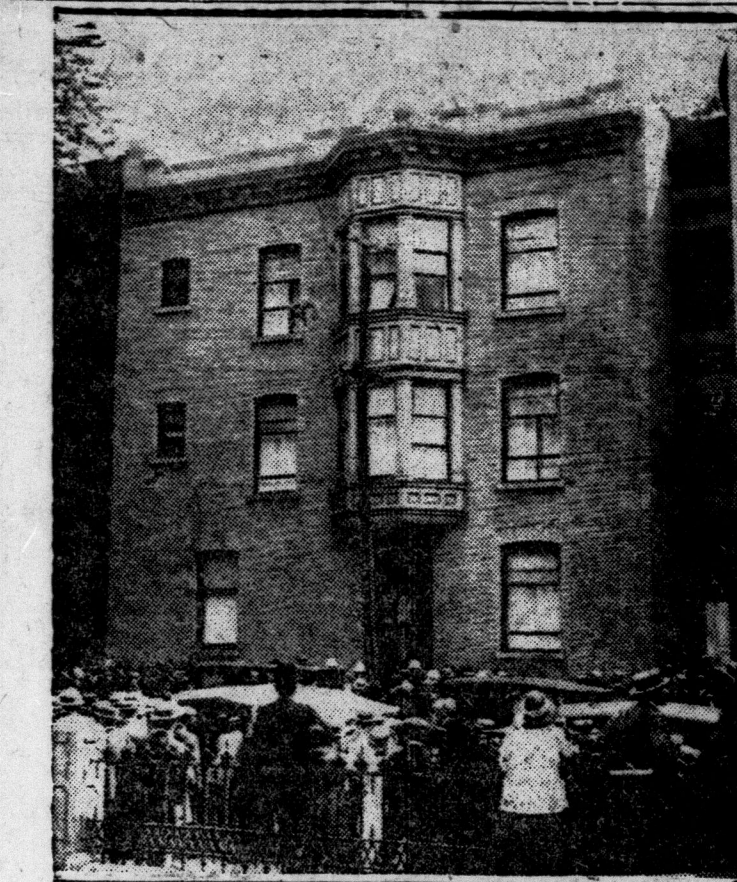

Claims Wood Told to Crush Philippine Independence

New York World Publishes Exposure Regarding Strike of the
Filipino Officials Against Attitude of Governor-General.

Associate Press Despatch.
New York, July 20.—A very frank
statement on the policy of the United
States in connection with the Philip-
pines is contained in an editorial
printed by the New York World this
morning. Discussing the situation
which has arisen through the protest
"strike" of Philippine officials against
the attitude of Governor-General
Wood, the World says that undoubt-
edly President Harding will support
General Wood because the present
difficulty with the statesmen of the
islands has arisen from a faithful
administration by the governor-gen-
eral of the policy favored at Wash-
ington, which is "to retard the move-
ment for Philippine independence by
every legal means attainable."

First of all, flowers should be gathered

same way. A little watering can may
be taken along and the blossoms
sprinkled while they wait. In the
case of such delicate flowers as "gay
ladies" (poppies) it is best to take
along a pitcher of water and pop

the stems into it immediately. They
will droop between the garden and
the house, otherwise.

A small handful of salt added to
the water will keep flowers fresh
much longer than usual, and the
best trick of all is to insert each
stem into the water and then, with
long-bladed shears, cut the stems
under water. This allows the water
to enter before the pores fill with

"Master of Men."

If Cullen Landis keeps on he ought
to be top-notch among the stars.
Again at the Allen, the remainder of

is so far off the beaten track and so
genuine that weak spots in the
school-day scenes and the somewhat
tiresome "four chapter" business are
absolutely forgotten. Cullen Landis
goes from one pitched battle to an-
other. Where scenes become entirely
too exciting, there is a diversion to
the delightful interludes of cattiness
between Wanda Hawley and Alice
Calhoun, the two lasses who loved
sailors.

It is a tale of the days of the Span-
ish-American war. Thus the costu-
mes have a chance to claim a little
extra attention. It seems quite a
daring thing for a director to present
costumes which are hopelessly out-
of-date, and yet not sufficiently out-
of-date to be picturesque, but the
venture succeeds admirably.

"The Law of the Lawless."

The French sheik makes his ap-
pearance in a very able sort of pic-
ture at Loew's. Charles de Roches
is but another of the stalwarts, uti-
lizing Valentino's absence to leap into
the limelight as a matinee idol. You
can judge for yourself, as he plays
with Dorothy Dalton in "The Law
of the Lawless."

As the name implies, it is a pic-
turesque film, wildly romantic, but
Dorothy Dalton, Theodore Kosloff, the
aforementioned sheik, and the scen-
ery do help to make it quite thrilling.

The story has to do with a Tartar
girl who becomes the unwilling bride
of a gypsy. Charles de Roches is the
gypsy, who, of course, is madly in
love with her. Only two things can
happen in a case like this. Either
the bride discovers she has made a
terrible, terrible mistake, and that it
is the erstwhile villain who really
possesses her heart, or else the
scenario writer thinks of something
original. You won't mind finding out
for yourself. There are one or two
flaws. Dorothy Dalton may be
plainly observed ejaculating an in-
credulous "Me!" at one point, when,
of course everyone knows that, as
being found out of a New England
home parlor. To offset these trifles
there are frequent bits of spontaneous
comedy which eke things out pretty
well.

A few words of praise might be in
place for parts of the vaudeville
numbers.

LONDON MARKSMEN GO TO LONG BRANCH

Crack Shots From This District
Will Be Less Numerous
This Year.

The annual matches of the Ontario
Rifle Association will be held at the
Long Branch ranges, near Toronto,
Aug. 6th to 10th, inclusive. Cash
prizes, aggregating \$7,000, will be
competed for, besides trophies to the
value of \$4,000. Reduced railway
fares have been arranged, and camp-
ing accommodation on the ranges
will be provided at nominal cost. Pro-

nue, Toronto.

While a good attendance is ex-
pected, the entries may be adversely
affected by the absence of the per-
manent militia units on strike duty
in Cape Breton. However, it is ex-
pected that members of the Bisley

will be back in time to take part in
the matches. Competition will un-
doubtedly be keen, and the standard
of marksmanship should be unusu-
ally high.
