CHINA ACCEPTS

Buys Arms Cargo of Seized Steamer Tatsu and Pays Demurrage

JAPAN TO STOP TRAFFIC

Secret Cruise of Naval Squad Coincidence

Pekin, March 14.—The negotiations looking towards a settlement of the difficulty between China and Japan growing out of the seizure by China of the Japanese steamer Tatsu Maru, are now making favorable progress. The Chinese foreign board today approved the draft of a document in which China accepts the proposals made by Japan yesterday. China will pay Japan 21,400 yen (\$10,-600) and retain the arms that form the cargo of the Tatsu Maru. She will pay also ten thousand taels demurrage on the steamer. It is expected that the Tatsu Maru will be released on March 16.

In addition, Japan agrees to adopt and enforce strict regulations to prevent future traffic in arms and ammunition from Japan to China, but she refuses to include the territory of Macao in this limitation. China will soon take up negotiations with Portugal regarding the contraband traffic at Macao. She hopes that an accurate delimitation of Portuguese waters at Macao will now be secured, and that the gambling for which Macao is notorious, as well as the smuggling done through that port, may be materially restricted. nay be materially restricted. It was pointed out further that this fact was announced two months ago, and that, therefore, the activity at Sasebo should not necessarily be considered in connection with the difficulty with China arising from the Tatsu Maru incident.

Liverpool, March 13.—A wireleas message received by the Cunard Steamship Company states that the Lusitania, which left here for New York on Saturday, made a record run of 627 knots from Monday noon to Tuesday noon. The Lusitania's run of 627 knots establishes a new world's record, the best previous day's westward run being 613 knots made on November 6th. On that run the Lusitania also broke the record for a westward voyage, crossing the Atlantic in four days 18 hours and 40 minutes.
