THE LANDLESS MEN

The Toronto World has this striking paragraph on the conditions of land-holding in Great Britain: "Feudalism and its traditions are chiefly responsible for the fact that out of England's acreage of 32,500,000 no less than 15,000,000 are held by 18,000 proprietors. In Scotland, 330 proprietors own two-thirds of the land, and 1,700 over nine-tenths of the whole country. While admittedly there are waste lands given over to game and unfitted for profitable use otherwise, it is equally true that much of the land reserved for sport is of the highest agricultural quality and could easily be a support to a large resident population. Meantime the small farmers and the farm laborers have been and are being driven away, either across the seas or to the slums of the big cities. Any remedies yet provided in England and Scotland do not grapple really with the problem. As compared with France and its 5,500,000 proprietors, having an average of fifteen acres each, Britain lags far behind in this respect and must do something to restore the land to the people."
