INTERNATIONAL BELL LINE.

Toronto Capitalists Interested in a New Electric Line at the Falls.
Niagara Falls, June 12.—W. M. Kyle of Toronto is in the city talking up the project of an international electric railway belt line. Mr. Kyle represents a large number of Canadian capitalists and is confident that his railroad scheme will be long in the making. If the plans already made do not miscarry, trolley line will start from the foot of Bridge-street, Niagara Falls, Ont., and run along Bridge-street to the cemetery, across the country to the old horse car line in Drummondville. The line will then run along Lady's Lane to Falls View, back over the route of the old line to the Michigan Central Railway Station at the top of the hill back of the Clifton House, thence down the hill past the Clifton House to the Canadian end of the new Suspension Bridge. Arrangements are now in progress for the building of a second bridge adjoining the present structure for the accommodation of double trolley tracks. If satisfactory arrangements can be made with the bridge company, the line after crossing this side, where arrangements can probably be made for running over existing lines to the railway suspension bridge. At this point the line can recross to Canada, the point of beginning, forming a complete belt line. It is also proposed to build a branch line from the Grand Trunk Railway Station at Niagara Falls, Ont., to St. David's, and thence to the Whirlpool. Mr. Kyle says that the right-of-way for the Canadian portion of the road has been secured, and his visit to the city today is for the purpose of discussing local capitalists in the scheme.
