

GIVEN POWER TO BORROW MONEY

Tobacco Growers at Kingsville Pass By-Law

ALTER CONSTITUTION

Shareholders Control 10,000,000 Pounds Tobacco

KINGSVILLE, Ont., April 29.—The Canadian Tobacco Growers' Association, in a special session here this afternoon, unanimously and enthusiastically supported a by-law to extend the borrowing powers of the organization. After the financial situation of the company was fully explained by several representatives the 150 shareholders present discussed the situation at length before reaching a conclusion in a standing vote.

Mr. John Cochill, general manager, explained to the shareholders the object of the meeting and called on Mr. Ivey, of Ivey & Ivey, of London, solicitor for this company.

Mr. Ivey at some length explained the circumstances that the management were placed in in regard to money to defray running expenses. The company had expected from shareholders, notes in payment for shares to the amount of \$30,000, but these could not be realized as there was no by-law in the company's constitution that empowered the management to borrow on the stock of tobacco an amount sufficient to pay the expense of grading and processing.

BY-LAW PREPARED

Mr. Ivey stated that he had prepared a by-law for the consideration of the shareholders, which he read and which gave the management absolute power to borrow on the security of the stock and plant a sufficient sum from time to time.

Mr. Cochill explained that the cost of grading, etc., was amounting to about 5 cents per pound. He also stated that there were about 2,100 shareholders in the company, who, according to estimate controlled 10,000,000 pounds of tobacco.

Of this amount about 1,000,000 pounds was already treated.

Mr. F. A. Falls, of Chatham, auditor of the company, explained the finances of the company and strongly recommended the adoption of the by-law.

The attendance was not so large as the March meeting. The representation covered the whole tobacco belt, including Essex, Kent and Middlesex.

IS SERIOUSLY BURNED BY GAS STOVE FLAMES

LEAMINGTON, April 29.—Mrs. Mary Warner, Marlboro street, was severely burned Thursday night while lighting a gas stove. About 6 o'clock she turned on the gas and attempted to light it when the flames rushed out of the stove, burning her seriously about the head and chest. She is at present suffering intense pain and is under the care of Dr. Turnbull, who has hopes for her recovery.

STRIKE ON D. U. R. LINES NOW SEEMS CERTAIN

DETROIT, April 29.—Motormen and conductors of the D.U.R. lines to-night voted 1,800 to 400 to reject the company's proposal to put lower wage scale into effect May 1. A strike is now practically certain on that date.

HOPES TO SAVE LIFE OF HER SON

Mrs. Garfield's Petition Signed by Many

IN COUNTY OF OXFORD
Methodist Clergyman Is Assisting Man's Mother

WOODSTOCK, April 29.—A good deal of success is being made by Mrs. Garfield, of Toronto, who is circulating a petition throughout Woodstock and Oxford County, asking that the sentence of death imposed on her son, Norman Garfield, for the murder of Ben Johnson, be commuted to life imprisonment. Mrs. Garfield is being assisted in securing signatures by Rev. Mr. Gaez, of Central Methodist Church. Many signatures are being obtained, and Mrs. Garfield seems quite hopeful.

The death took place last night of Mrs. Michael Cook, following a short illness. She is survived by her husband and two sons.

THREATENING FIRE AT REGINA IS OVERCOME

REGINA, Sask., April 29.—The downtown business district of this city was threatened with destruction this morning, when fire destroyed the Auditorium rink and automobiles valued at \$200,000 stored in the building.

Only the hardest kind of a fight saved the district, and several times other buildings in the vicinity of the rink were on fire.

The origin of the fire is unknown.

DUTCH FARMERS FOR ONTARIO

DECLARE EFNER WAS SPEEDING

Inquest Into Death of Former Londoner Opened

MANY WITNESSES HEARD

Case to Be Continued at Union on May 16

UNION, April 29.—(By Staff Reporter.)—On account of the absence of several witnesses, who actually saw the accident occur, and in view of the fact that Dr. F. O. Lawrence, attending physician, stated that Miss Helen Hutchinson will be able to give evidence in about two weeks' time, the inquest into the death of Carl Efner, a former Londoner, who was killed last Saturday night on the Gravel road just south of here, was adjourned to-night until Monday, May 16.

Coroner Dr. Edwin presided to-night and Crown Attorney McCrimmon examined the witnesses. The evidence of a number of those who had seen the car and been near the scene of the accident was heard to-night. It was stated that Efner was traveling at a high rate of speed. No definite speed was named, although several witnesses stated that he was traveling at a greater rate of speed than the law would permit.

T. H. McCoombe and his daughter, Edna McCoombe, saw the deceased and the lady drive up to their store about 7:10 on the night in question. He purchased gasoline and drove toward Port Stanley. When the accident was reported they went to the scene and found the car facing toward the south instead of north. About 20 minutes elapsed between the purchase of gasoline and the accident. In that time the deceased had apparently traveled to Port Stanley and back to Union, for he was seen at Port Stanley about 7:30 by Mrs. Dunn and Mrs. Morgan, both of Port Stanley.

FOUND EFNER DEAD

H. Lane saw the car pass his house going south and about 20 minutes later rushed out to find it turned upside-

down. He and others got Miss Hutchinson out from between the wheel and fender. Mr. Efner was then lying dead. That there was an odor of liquor in the vicinity of the deceased, sufficiently strong to convince him that he had been drinking, was the statement of B. H. Cook. Others admitted smelling liquor, but would not swear that the deceased had been drinking prior to the accident. No bottles were found either in the car or the near vicinity, although each witness was closely questioned as to this by the crown attorney.

The post mortem examination made by Dr. F. O. Lawrence, showed that Mr. Efner died of internal hemorrhage. No mention was made by the doctor of finding any liquor in the stomach of the deceased.

Other witnesses examined were: A. Patterson, B. H. Cook, Mrs. Chute, Mr. Blakely, C. Desmond and Mrs. Desmond, Roy Chapman and others. Crown Attorney McCrimmon declared emphatically that the case could not be closed without the evidence of Miss Hutchinson, who was with Mr. Efner. He was very anxious to hear her testimony. Dr. Lawrence promised that she would be able to attend in two weeks.

ATTEMPTED TO ROB WOMAN ON TRAIN

Wife of Reeve of Paisley Has Exciting Experience While Returning From Toronto

PAISLEY, April 29.—While returning with her children from a visit in Toronto Mrs. D. Forrester, wife of Reeve Forrester, was made the victim of an attempted robbery on the train near Clifford Station.

At that point there were but few passengers in the coach and a young man behind Mrs. Forrester casually made the remark that her baby seemed sleepy and at the same time snatched at her pearl necklace, which he was not successful in securing. Then he made a grab for her purse, which was in the pocket of a coat she was wearing. The purse was afterwards found on the floor of the car, the man having dropped it when Mrs. Forrester cried out in alarm.

The man left the car by the rear door, which was only a seat or two away, and was later discovered by the conductor in the smoker.

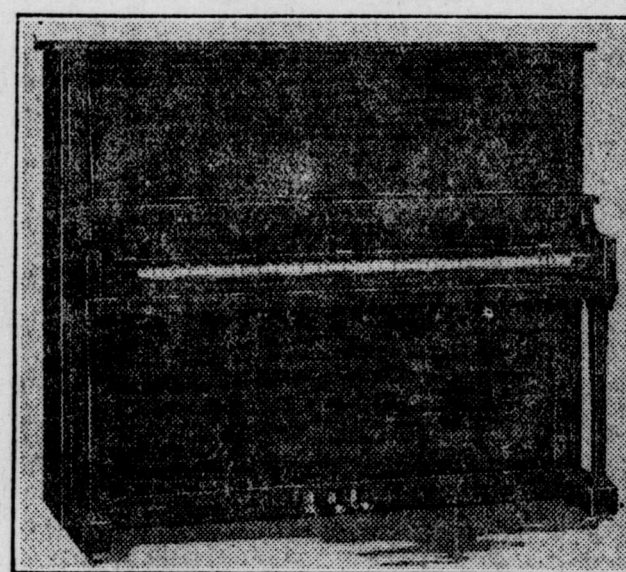

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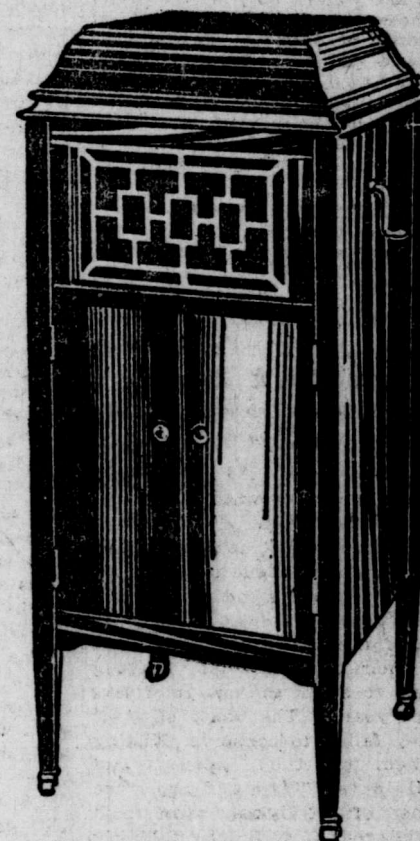

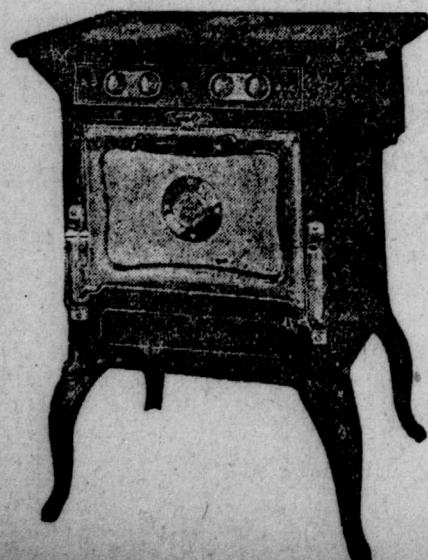
