

Western University Degrees Conferred

At the annual Convocation of the Western University, London, on Thursday, degrees were conferred on twenty-one persons and many scholarships and prizes awarded to successful students. Addresses were made by Ven. Archdeacon Cady, of Toronto, and by the Chancellor of the University, Hon. W. J. Roche, of Ottawa, Minister of the Interior. One of the graduating class, Mr. F. H. Curran, has won one of the best fellowships at Cornell University, where he will pursue his studies next year; while Miss A. D. Turville will spend three months at Ottawa as the winner of the Canadian History Research Scholarship.

In spite of the war great progress is being made by the Western University. A two hundred acre site has been purchased for new buildings, which is unexcelled by any university in eastern Canada; a large legacy has been bequeathed, the Government and city grants have been increased, the faculties have been greatly strengthened, the Libraries and laboratories wonderfully improved and the Medical School has received a higher rating which makes it the equal of nearly all of the better institutions.

The latest addition to the faculty is that of Professor W. Sherwood Fox, Ph. D., a former Canadian, now of Princeton University, one of the best classical scholars of the United States. He is an author of splendid repute and an excellent teacher. It is expected that two or three other professors of similar standing will be engaged during the next few weeks, all of whom will be on a par with the best men in the other universities, thus assuring students that they can now receive in this Western Ontario University a training of the very highest kind to be obtained anywhere.

Power To Put On "Indian List"

License Inspector P. D. McCallum has been notified of important amendments made to the Ontario Temperance Act, the principal addition being to the effect that the local inspector is given power to place all parties addicted to the use of intoxicating beverages on the restricted list. In addition to this as soon as any person has been so prohibited the inspector may notify all express companies or other common carriers in the community that further deliveries will be liable to prosecution, and the shipments confiscated.

The inspector is given full power to place any parties he may see fit on the restricted list.
