TO THE INDEPENDENT ELECTORS
OF THE COUNTY OF
CHARLOTTE.

GENTLEMEN,
In compliance with a requisition
numerously signed, and anxious to serve the
Country in the way that you desire, I intend
to come before you as a candidate at the ap-
proaching Election, and have for that purpose
vacated my seat in the Legislative Council.
Having been elected five times in suc-
cession by your fathers and yourselves, and
having served in the House of Assembly as a
"Member for Charlotte," for twenty years, at
a time when our Provincial Governments
were in a changing and unsettled condition;
and having ever been a supporter of those
measures which at length placed the engra-
ted resources of the Colony, and the Govern-
ment thereof also, in the hands of the people
themselves-my "sayings and doings" are
recorded with the public transactions of that
important period, to which, as indications of
my future course, I respectfully beg leave to
refer you.

My principles with regard to the science of
Government, and political economy, remain
unchanged; and should I have the honour to
be again returned as one of your Representa-
tives, you may expect, on my part, all prac-
icable endeavours to improve our Educational
system, in order that useful knowledge may
be diffused, and the people qualified, not only
to transact the common business of life, but
also to exercise those natural rights of self go-
vernment, for which I have ever been an humble
advocate, and which are now so fully con-
ceded by the Imperial authorities to the in-
habitants of the Colonies.

I will endeavour to discourage vice and
immorality, by example as well as by legis-
lation, and do all in my power to promote
peace, harmony, and good will, among the
various religious denominations, in order
that they may "dwell together in unity."

As a Political Economist, I am opposed to the
Protective System, and in favour of that
liberal policy so successful in the Mother
Country. I will encourage, by all means,
Agriculture, the Fisheries, Manufactures (in-
cluding Ships and Lumber of all kinds), and
Commerce, but will not consent to the im-
position of high duties in favour of any in-
terest whatever. On the contrary, I would
impose duties only for the purpose of raising
an adequate Revenue, exempting, as far as
possible, those articles of prime necessity,
required by the operative classes for carry-
ing on their business.

Among the laws that require amendment,
the most prominent are the Revenue Law,
the Election Law, the laws relating to the
Education of youth, the Road Laws, and the
whole system of Internal Improvement, the
Jury system, and several others-and last,
but not least, the constitution and practice of
the Courts of Law, which none but lawyers
pretend to understand, and even that itself is
questionable.

GENTLEMEN-The present is an age of
progress. Retrogression is impossible. Our
 motto should be, "Onward and Upward."
Let us therefore be up and doing. We have
a fine Province, a healthy climate, twenty
millions of acres of land, the greater part of
superior quality, metals and minerals of great
and growing value, abundance of timber for
ship building, exportation, manufacture, and
fuel-noble rivers and streams, excellent
harbours, and fisheries around our coasts,
unequalled in the wide world.

We want more people. Let us encourage
emigration-encourage early marriages-encour-
age Loyalty to our Queen and Country-encour-
age our sons and daughters to re-
main in the Province, and impress upon their
minds the important truth, that happiness,
which is their "being's end and aim," will
be more readily found, and better enjoyed,
among the healthy, industrious, and independ-
ent settlers of New Brunswick, than among
the feverish and excited masses who crowd
the streets of San Francisco!

Gentlemen, I beg to assure you, that it is
from no want of respect that I have omitted
to call on you for your votes, but because I
deem the practice highly improper; you
ought to be your own judges, and exercise
your important privileges freely. Hoping to
meet you at the Hustings on the day of nom-

candidate than myself have your preference,
then run steady for such a one, that you may
secure his services, and if your free and pru-
dent selection, then I should feel bound to help
you in the work, only make a prudent selection
and should I be your choice, then I sincerely
will strive that my votes shall be at all times
cast on the side of a good conscience, and in
liberal justice to all my fellow men. To
those who are willing to give me support, to
them I will feel grateful, and will endeavour
by proper conduct to win a returning gra-
