## Marine News

Schr Emma Belliveau sailed from Georgetown, S. C. April 15 for Havana.

Schr M. A. Belliveau, Capt Belliveau, sailed from Tampa, Fla. on April 17 for Sagua La Grande.

Schr W. S. McDonald, Capt Geo Duffly, arrived at Barbadoes April 5 from Moss Point.

Schr Whiteaway, Capt Kenneth Merriam, arrived Turks Island April 8th to load salt for Boston.

The term, schr. C. Maude Gaskill, 397 tons, is on passage from Turks Island to Grand Manan, with a cargo of salt.

Schr Leo LeBlanc, Capt John Richard, sailed from Havana, April 7 for Port Arthur, to load for South America.

The Danish seamen's strike is becoming increasingly serious and Denmark is virtually cut off from Great Britain and America.

The schooner Nellie, Capt J. T. Salter, cleared from Digby Wednesday for Boston with spruce scantling shipped by Dunfield and Co. Ltd.

A telephone message states that on Sunday the schr W. G. Robertson, Capt Theriault, rescued a crew, consisting of 21 men, of Georges Bank, from an English vessel named The Westgate, halting from Liverpool, Eng., and landed them at Shelburne.

Captain L. F. Barkhouse, of Westport, recently sold the schooner Edith F. S. to Captain Martin, of Halifax. Captain Barkhouse will accompany Captain Martin to that port. This trim little coaster, well known in Nova Scotia waters, was built at LaHave in 1905 and registers 67 tons.

A Yarmouth despatch says: Lobster fishermen in spite of the heavy gales of the past few days continue to make large catches of fish and the prices held strong giving the men splendid returns. Several of these engaged in the industry at Port Maitland and vicinity last week made from \$500 to \$600 for the week's work.

The St. John pilot boat, Howard D. Troop, was sunk in collision with the steamer Canadian Voyager off Petite Passage 50 miles from St. John Saturday. All the crew were rescued and taken aboard the steamer. The pilot boat was valued at \$15,000 and was uninsured she was owned by St. John pilots.

The knockabout schr Pauline B. Mosher, built for Lunenburg parties, was launched on Tuesday from the K. & S. Shipyards, Yarmouth. The vessel is a credit to the builders, and measures 134 ft over all, 26 feet wide, 11 feet deep, and about 160 tons gross. The interior finish is oak, while the fore-castle is in soft wood. The vessel will be rigged in Yarmouth and will be ready for sea in about two weeks.

Mrs. T. H. and W. S. MacDonald, of Meteghan, have sold their splendid tern schooner, W. S. MacDonald, to a New York shipping corporation. The schooner is 281 tons and was launched at Meteghan last fall and has since been in the southern trade. Captain John Duffy, of Saint-Nicolas, is master of the vessel and is now at Yarmouth where she will discharge and return to Mobile thence back to Havana after which the schooner will come to New York.

According to word received here the tern schooner Maid of Scotland, which left St. Michael's Azores, for Jacksonville, Florida in February went ashore recently on the Florida coast, and may be a total loss. The vessel is said to have struck on Crescent Beach, about 40 or 50 miles south of Jacksonville her destination. No particulars have been received. The Maid of Scotland is a Nova Scotia built craft, having been launched from the yard of Omer Blinn, at Grosses Coques last year. She registered 438 tons.

Lunenburg Progress Enterprise: The lobster fishermen are having hard luck this spring for the weather up to the present time, has been the worst ever known by the oldest fishermen. Last Wednesday a storm was very severe on our coast and many fishermen lost a great number of traps, and in some places the shore was strewn with remnants of fishing gear. The catch of lobsters the past several weeks has been very small, owing to the rough weather. The price holds at 25 cents for large ones, 15 cents for mediums, and 12 cents per lb. for small.

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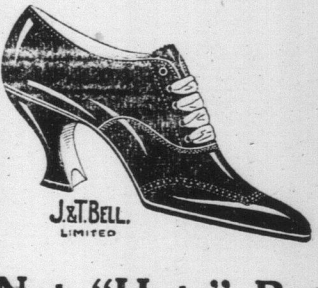
