MARINE
Tern schooner Stewart T. Salter, Captain Charles Salter, has completed extensive repairs at Port Greville and is loading plaster at Walton.

The Rosalie Belliveau, formerly a Weymouth vessel, arrived at St. John's, Nfld., April 5, with salt from Cadz. She was in harbor at Placentia a month because of ice conditions.

Yermouth Light:—Schr. Eddie James, Capt. Ansel Snow, of the Walker fishing fleet, arrived in port Thursday morning with a broken main boom. The schooner has a fare of 2000 halibut and 8000 cod.

More lobsters were taken and more cash was received during the month of March by the fishermen using the waters of Digby Municipality than during the two months of March and April last year. During March the cash receipts were over \$57,000 and the total receipts for the whole season last year were about \$95,000.

The first mackerel of the season was caught on Monday last week off Chincoteague Virginia, according to news reaching the Boston fish pier. Another was also taken Tuesday. The sealing and netting fleets in the south should be encountering schools of the fish any day now. Last year the first mackerel were taken on March 31. Schr. Stilleto, Capt. Ralph Webster, was the first seiner to take fish a year ago, 2000 pounds being landed at Cape May April 14.

Friday's Halifax Herald:—The schooner Lucy R., Captain O. F. McKenzie, arrived in port yesterday from Kingston, Jamaica, via Shelburne. As before reported in The Herald, the schooner was to load salt at Turk's Island for Halifax, but got blown off her course after leaving Kingston in ballast, and fetched up at Shelburne, Captain Ronald Nauts is to take command of the vessel, which is to go in the trade to St. Pierre and Newfoundland, after receiving the necessary overhaul. J. Foster Robd is the owner of the Lucy R.

After many years, Parrsboro has a newspaper, called the Record. At present it looks as though another—the Leader—will also be started, and then it will be a case of the survival of the fittest.
