#### ITS HISTORY IN A FEW WORDS.

The Catholic Mutual Benefit Association was organized in July, 1876.

The Grand Council was organized Feb. 10th, 1880. Incorporated in Ontario, January 18th, 1880. Registered in Ontario, August 22n 2, 1892. Incorporated in the Dominion of Canada, in March, 1893.

Received a cartificate of registration from the Part 1889.

Received a certificate of registration from the Do-minion Government, December 27th, 1894. The Grand Council is termed the Association, in-

corporated for the following purposes and objects:

corporated for the following purposes and objects:—

(a) To unite fraternally all persons entitled to member, ship under the constitution and laws of the Association.

(b) To improve the social, intellectual and moral condition of the members of the Association, and to educate them in integrity, sobriety and frugality.

(c) To establish, manage and disburse a Mutual Bonefit and a Reserve Fand, from which, within aixty days after the receipt at the office of the Secretary of the Association of salisfactory oridence of the death of a member of the Association, who has compiled with its lawful requirements, a sum not exceeding \$2,000 shall be paid by the Association to the willow, orphans, dependents or other boneficiary whom the deceased member has designated, or to the legal representatives of such deceased member.

In each province in which the Association transacts business it appoints an agent under power of attorney, bearing the seal of the Association and signed by the President and Secretary, to receive service of process in all suits and proceedings against the Association in the province in which said agent resides

Franches are composed of the members of the Association, and are the channels of admission. Their officers transact all business, such as the collection of beneficiary and other monies, and attend to all the contine work of their respective branches.

The Grand Council is the governing bely, and is composed of representatives of the branches. It holds a convention of the Association every two years.

All officers receiving and distincting monies are under bonds for the proper performance of their duties.

The funds of the Association are termed: -Bone-deciary Fund, Reserve Fund, and General Fund.

## Beneficiary Fund.

The Berth sary Fund is derived from monthly accommon, regulated by the Constitution, for the purpose I paying the beneficiaries of deveaced members. It cannot be used for any other purpose. The same thus obtained from members are transferred directly from the branch treasury to the Grand Countries. cil, and thence to the hencilcian's of the decemend members within the time fixed by the Constitution, and the Act of Incorporation.
Since the formation of the Grand Council, the sum
