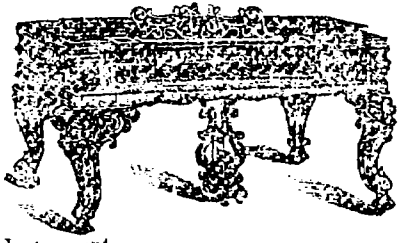

The Week.

HOME NEWS.

During the present season, the live stock shipments from Montreal comprised 40,841 cattle and 59,098 sheep.

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—The Marquis DePassano is at the head of a gigantic scheme of immigration from France to the Canadian North-West.

Before the Governor-General embarks for England on Saturday next, he will be presented on the wharf with an address by the Lieutenant Governor of Quebec.

A company has been formed in Whitehall, N. Y., with a capital of \$100,000, for the purpose of handling Canadian lumber.

Messrs. Delalonde, of Paris, and Royal, M.P. for Provencier, Manitoba, have purchased 400,000 acres of land in the North-West Territories to establish a French colony.

The Mechanical Engineer of the Department of Public Works is now in Montreal, looking into the electric light business, with a view to its introduction into the Government buildings.

The name and business of W. H. Johnson, Halifax, has become quite popular of late—almost celebrated, from having made such a display of fine Pianos and Organs at the recent Dominion Exhibition, where several first prizes were awarded him.

A grape sugar factory is being started in Toronto. The contract has already been made for the construction of the building, which is expected to cost \$600,000, exclusive of machinery.

NEWS FROM ABROAD.

Tunis, Oct. 30.—The French column from Tebessa has arrived at Kairouan. Several leading inhabitants have been arrested.

Portland, Me., Oct. 30.—The race between Haulan and Ross has been declared off for this fall, but will take place next spring.

At the present time, the capital sunk in Atlantic cables is about £11,000,000 sterling, and the length of cable is about 29,500 miles.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 28.—The Wlozheska court martial sentenced two of the leaders in the anti-Jewish riots of last June to ten years' exile in Siberia.

Hanibal, Mo., Oct. 28.—The Sny levee broke in a third place this morning, and the water is sweeping over the entire bottom. The losses will aggregate \$300,000.

Constantinople, Oct. 30.—The Greeks have expelled the Turkish post-office employees at Larissa. The Sultan ordered two iron-clads to remain during the winter at Tripoli.

New York, Oct. 30.—A Dublin special gives a gist of the pastoral to be issued by Archbishop McCabe to day, in which he says: "If notice to pay no rents be not teaching of communism, communism is yet to be defied."

Dublin, Oct. 30.—Already 7,500 cases are before the Land Court. There seems to be reaction setting in. Although there are 400 Leagueurs in prison occasional events show that the spirit underlying the League movements still survives.

Panama, Oct. 18, via New York, Oct. 28.—The occupation of the important town and department of Pueria, Peru, has been effected by the Chilianis, who suddenly landing in Paria 1500 strong and at once marched inland, 207 entering the city without firing a shot.

London, Oct. 29.—A Company for working the telephone in the principal countries of Europe has been registered under the style of Edison's Gower Dial Telephone Co. of Europe, with a capital of £500,000.
