THOMAS WALLIS.

Thomas Wallis was a man for whom Davis had a great, and perhaps an inordinate admiration—that exaggerated estimate which a generous nature is not to form of him who gave it the first impulse in a noble direction. He had been a tutor in Trinity College, and was reputed to be one of the fathers of the national movement which began there in 1840. He had been for a time editor of the Citizen, but had never hitherto written for the Nation. He lived indeed, as secluded and unwholesome a life as Mangan, and to the majority of Davis' friends was a scat of Veiled Prophet. Wallis was a small, dark man, with lively eyes and a smile of constituted the prophet. Wallis was a small, dark man, with lively eyes and as smile of constituted the teachers commonly presents itself; but calm and impartial, like the sentiment of a dethroned prince kept out of his undoubted rights for a time by ungrateful subjects. In naked intellectual force he might perhaps have matched Davis: but the moral qualities which were Davis' masterspells—complete unselfishness, sympathy with other men's work, and an everpresent purpose for which he was ready to "spin and be spent"—were wanting. Davis never thought of himself, and he worked miracles; Wallis was not vulgarly selfish, but he could not ignore for an instant his own claims and pretensions, and he secomplished next to nothing. Whatever he knew was readily producible in conversation; it was as a talker he was most effective and persuasive; while of Davis it well and persuasive; which

like an iceberg, of which two thirds were under water, only one-third visible.

A talk with Wallis when his spirits were not clouded by the petty cares which are apt to await a man who refuses to do the world's work in the world's way was a great enjoymen. He had a wide range of knowledge, and possessed the invaluable faculty of taiking in shorthand—expressing himself by allusions and symbols, instead or running into wearisome detail. He projected work with an audacity of imagination which rivalled Coleridge's; but a newspaper was too limited an area for his prodigious ground-plans; and I used to believe, in those days, that if the newspaper were a quarterly review, a quarto volume would have become his standard. The picture which has come down to us of Hazlitt, isolated and angry, conscious of great powers, and believing nimself un airly and inientionally repressed, would almost answer for Wallis; except that he did not in the smallest degreeshare. Hazlitt's morbid horror of contempt and disparagement from the crowd. His complaint was not that the world undervalued him—the ignorant world would blunder, of course—but he was corely touched by the penalty he was paying for the offence. COMMERCIAL. WEEKLY REVIEW -- WHOLESALE MARKETS.

For the past few days there has been no further causes for anxiety beyond rumors of failures, which have turned out to be without foundation. It will be matter for surprise, however, if the spring passes without the newspapers being in a position to record additional "smash ups," as trade has been unduly forced by mushroom concerns in every branch of trade, who have been assisted to a greater extent than they should have been by banking institutions. The cigar trade has been quite demoralized over the suspension of three large firms whose failure brought to light the fact that they were ruining their own prospects and injuring others by selling at prices considerably below cost. In the dry goods trade the movement is far from satisfactory. The opening out of spring goods in the wholesale millindepartments has been the features of the week, considerable country buyers being in the city in conse-quence. The London wool sales are reported to be a success. Prices have been so high that Canadian orders could not be executed, although buyers had their limits advanced 2c per lb. A report of the London fur sales says:—"At the Hudson Bay sale, bear sold 20 per cent higher; wolverine 15 per cent do; lynx 15 do; sliver fox 20 per cent do; cross fox 10 per cent lower; ofter 121 per cent lower. Fisher, red fox, skunk, mink and wolf unchanged, all in comparison last Merch sale. Advices from Lampson's sele show sea ofter 15 per cent higher than July.

IROM AND HARDWARE .- Sales on spot were limited. There has been some business for spring delivery on the basis of \$23.50 for No. Gartsherrie and Coltness, and \$2 less for No. 1 Eglinton and No. 1 Dalwellington, In spot brands at \$26 to \$27, and of Eglinton at \$23 50. At Viger Market sesterday the offerings of cattle were light, being between 10 and 150 head, the quality showing a fair average. Prices were firm on the basis of those ruling on Thursday last. Good to choice butchers' cattle sold at 51c to 53c per 1b, live weight, medium to fair grades at 41c to 5, and inferior lean beasts, which were few, at 33c to 4c. Sheep were in demand, but there were very f-woffering. A fine spring lamb was bought at the cars for \$7. A few calves were sold at from \$350 to 700 each.

MONTREAL HORSE MARKET.

The shipments of horses from this city to the United States for the week ending March 10th were 88 head. costing \$10,428, against 298 head. costing \$34 619.60 for the corresponding period last year. The average price paid by American dealers last week was \$118.50 against \$118.17 for the corresponding week in 1882. At Mr. James Maguire's stables sales were reported of a pair of bright bay heavy draught horses, 6 years old, weighing 2,500 lb., for \$425 which ware-sold immediately afterwards at a profit of \$30, a bay mare, 5 years old, 1,500 lb. weighing 1,600 lbs., for \$175, and a pair of bays (horse and mare), 5 and 7 years old, weighing 2,400 lbs., for \$360. A fair demand exists for all desirable carriage, saddle, and heavy draught horses at good prices. 
