The Free Press is authority for the statement that a lilac tree at the corner of York and Hargrave streets has begun to bud again, wooded into flower by the present mild weather.

The nuns who are exposed to danger in South Africa have refused to leave their posts. Salvationist lasses have, says a telegram, left for safe retreats.—Catholic Times (Eng.).

Last Saturday afternoon, Nov. 4, people in Winnipeg and St. Boniface sat out on their verandahs, basking in 75° of sunshine under a cloudless sky, still waiting for the first snow.

While in Ottawa lately His Grace the Archbishop of St. Boniface visited the hospital of the Sisters of Mercy, Richmond road, belonging to the same order as the Sisters of Mercy of Winnipeg.

The Archbishop of New York has sold the Catholic Orphan Asylum, on Fifth avenue, in that city, for \$2,500,000. A new building will be erected in a quarter where land is less valuable.

The Oblate Fathers, shut up at Kimberley just now with Bishop Gaughren, are Fathers Lenoir, Morin and Varnat. In Ladysmith are Fathers Murray and Saby, and in Mafeking Father George Ogle, also Oblates.

The Tribune had better look to its press work. Last Tuesday the copy we received had pages 2, 3, 6 and 7 blank, thus depriving us of its editorial wisdom. A few days before, the numbering and folding of the pages were all wrong.

The latest news from Natal is still very alarming. No official dispatches have been made public by the London war office in the last 48 hours. It is hoped that Sir George Stewart White will be able to hold out in beleaguered Ladysmith.

Floyd county, Indiana, boasts of a deputy sheriff 98 years old. Deputy Stephens is the grand jury bailiff, serves his subpoenas and attends to his duties in a manner truly remarkable for a man who lacks less than two years of being a centenarian.

The communal council of Weimar, duchy of Saxe-Weimar, have decided to demolish a house in order to make clear the approach to a Catholic church. It is curious that the name of the proprietor of the house is Luther

and that of the demolishing syndicate Papist, in English Pope.

The venerable senior priest of the Northwest, Father Dandurand, O. M. I., is visiting the Oblate Fathers at St. Mary's presbytery, Winnipeg.

The St. Boniface post office was removed last Tuesday from its recent site on Taché avenue to the Provencher avenue entrance of Guilbault's store.

Rev. J. A. Magnan, O. M. I., of Selkirk, is at the Archbishop's palace. He leaves to-day for Roseau River, where he will visit the Indian reserve during a fortnight.

Mr. Bernier, the new clerk of the immigration department, has taken up his residence in the house formerly occupied by Mr. Béliveau, 168 Austin street, Winnipeg.

The celebration of the silver jubilee of the arrival in Manitoba of the Sisters of the Holy Names is put off till December 14th, in order that His Grace Archbishop Langevin, O. M. I., now detained in Montreal by urgent business, may be present.

General Yule, who conducted that masterly retreat from Glencoe, is the son of the Seigneur of Chambly, near Montreal, and studied at Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Que. He and his brothers were very popular in the houses of the gentry along the Chambly river.

For Small Boys.

The Sisters of Charity of St. Boniface, yielding to repeated requests from various quarters, have determined to undertake the management of a boarding-house for boys between the ages of six and twelve. Special halls will be set apart for them, where, under the care and supervision of the Grey Nuns, they will be prepared for their First Communion, while attending either the Preparatory Department of St. Boniface College or the classes of Provencher Academy. This establishment will be known as "Le Jardin de l'Enfance" (Kindergarten).

The results already attained in similar institutions of the Order give every reason to hope that this arrangement will fill a long felt want.

Board and lodging will cost six dollars a month. For the boys who attend Provencher Academy there will be an additional charge of fifty cents a month; and for those who take music lessons, \$3 a month.

Bedding, mending and washing will be extra. The Sisters are willing to attend to these extras on terms to be arranged with them. The boys who attend the Preparatory Department of St. Boniface College will have to pay the tuition fees of the College.

"STOP THIEF!"

It is an old trick among the light-fingered fraternity to divert attention from themselves by raising the cry of "stop thief" and so putting the public on a false scent.
