

2. Was this honey graded or inspected by Canadian fruit and vegetable inspectors?
3. Did this honey conform to Canadian grades and classifications?
4. Was any of this honey detained because of failure to conform with class and grade marked on packages?
5. If so, how many pounds were placed under detention?
6. How many pounds of manufacturing honey were imported into Canada from the United States of America, during the calendar year 1957?
7. How many pounds from other countries, and from what countries?

The House resumed debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Harkness, seconded by Mr. Brooks,—That Bill No. 237, An Act to provide for the Stabilization of the Prices of Agricultural Commodities, be now read the second time.

And on the proposed motion of Mr. McCullough, seconded by Mr. Zaplitny, in amendment thereto,—That Bill No. 237 be not now read a second time but that the subject matter thereof be referred to the Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization.

And the debate continuing; the said debate was interrupted at ten o'clock.
