## PURCHASE OF BOND ISSUE BY BANK OF CANADA

Mr. Aiken: Mr. Speaker, may I ask a supplementary question. Is the government lending \$55 million to the C.N.R. to redeem an issue due on May 15 and, if so, what is the interest rate involved?

## INCREASE IN INTEREST RATES ON GOVERNMENT BONDS

On the orders of the day:

Mr. Henri Latulippe (Compton-Frontenac): Mr. Speaker, I should like to put a question to the Minister of Finance.

In the last few days, the Minister of Finance announced an increase in the interest rate of a few million dollars in government bonds, to convert matured bonds which the government is unable to refund at maturity. This rise in the interest rate varies between 2 and 21 per cent and I would like to know whether this increase is included in the blue book containing the estimates for 1968.
