Mr. Barnett J. Danson (Parliamentary Secretary to Prime Minister): I am informed by the Indian Claims Commissioner as follows: 1. Yes.

2. (a) February 23, 1972; (b) April 3, 1972; (c) New Zealand, February 28, 1972 to March 12, 1972; Australia, March 12, 1972 to March 31, 1972.

3. To gain first hand knowledge of the nature of Maori and aboriginal claims, grievances, and approaches to settlement, for purposes of comparison to Canadian Indian claims and grievances.

4. Dr. Barber was not accompanied by any member of his staff. However, the Commissioner's Director of Legal Research travelled independently to Australia and New Zealand from February 24, 1972 to March 12, 1972, during which period he spent some time with Dr. Barber.

**Mr. Diefenbaker:** Mr. Speaker, I rise in connection with the failure of the government to answer questions. I do not like to have to raise this, but the House is entitled to the respect of the government. What is happening is that questions that might prove embarrassing to the government are not being answered.

I have mentioned this matter before and of necessity I have to raise it again, because starred questions are to be answered in a reasonable time. The normal time is four days. Question No. 446, which was placed on the order paper on March 28, has remained unanswered. What is the use of a starred question unless it is going to be answered? In view of the fact it has not been answered, I hope Your Honour will not consider it remiss if I direct some questions to the government concerning this matter that is obviously being concealed. My question was:

How many Red Ensigns were in the possession of the Department of Public Works on the date the present flag came into existence?

I also asked how many were still on hand. It should not take very long to answer that question if they tell the truth.

My other question, No. 354, is not a starred question, but it is one that is requisite so that the farmers of western Canada may know what the situation was with respect to the final wheat payments for the 1970 crop year. My question asked:

What was the total amount disbursed by the Wheat Board for final wheat payments for the 1970 crop year?

The answer is available to the government any time it wishes to give it. Second, my question asked:

How many producers received payments in each of the prairie provinces?
