What is the number of countries that have their companies manufacture products for export in (a) "metric" (b) "imperial"?

Mr. David Berger (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs): Restrictions as to whether goods traded are in metric or imperial units are imposed by the importing not the exporting country. Currently, there are 154 United Nations countries of which 152 are metric or are converting to metric usage.
