This government intermediary provides the kind of support which Canadian businesses have come to appreciate, all the more so since it encourages women's entrepreneurship.

Mr. Maurice Foster (Algoma): Mr. Speaker, the Ontario Federation of Agriculture has passed a motion recent-

ly to censure the Minister for International Trade for saying that the Deputy Prime Minister should be ashamed of himself for providing \$8.8 billion of support to Canadian farmers.

Canadian farmers are outraged by the comments of the minister of trade because they are simply not true. He quotes financial support programs that the government provided in 1987 and 1988, most of which the government has since cancelled.

In fact, direct farm support programs this year will be less than \$2 billion. This shows how the minister of trade is trying to mislead Canadians.

How can Canadian farmers have confidence in the minister of trade to protect their interests at the GATT negotiation when he demonstrates such a woeful ignorance of the very documents that he himself has tabled there? It is time the Deputy Prime Minister or someone with integrity in the government sets the record straight on the amount of Canadian farm support programs because we have not heard the truth from the Minister for International Trade.

MULTICULTURALISM
