HAMILTON, Nov. 16,—Success has a last crowned the efforts of Mayor Alla in securing for the people of Hamilto. seven-cent milk. Arrangements have been completed with an east end dealer to deliver the lacteal fluid at seven cents per quart, and all orders left at his store will receive immediate attention. The mayor is asking the people to continue the strike for a few days longer, as he is confident the larger companies will reduce their price to eight cents, and probably seven cents, per quart.


