

greatly in danger from the boiling of pitch-pots and burning the bottoms of vessels in the Cul-de-sac, it is ordered that from and after the publication hereof no person or persons do presume to boil any pitch in pots on the King's Wharf or in any part of the Cul-de-sac, or the streets adjacent thereto, or burn or cause to be burned the bottom of any ship or vessel lying in the said Cul-de-sac, or along any of the wharves or quays adjacent thereto, on pain of forty shillings.

XIII. Many of the chimnies and gables of pinion-walls of the houses in Quebec being represented to be in great decay for want of repairs, It is ordered that the Overseer, to prevent accidents by fire, do examine the same, and where he finds any chimnies or walls of houses in decay, so as to endanger the lives of his Majesty's subjects, that he give notice in writing to the owner or occupier of such houses where the walls or chimnies are in decay, to repair the same in two months from the date of such notice, any person refusing to comply with such order or notice shall forfeit the sum of twenty shillings.

XIV. No person or persons shall presume to throw any stones, sticks, &c. from the ramparts into the Lower-town of Quebec, on pain of ten shillings.

XV. No butcher or butchers shall after the publication hereof, sell or cause to be sold, any butchers meat otherwise than by weight, and in such public stalls in the market-place as shall be allotted for that purpose by the Commissioners of the Peace, on pain of forty shillings.

XVI. That no person or persons do for the future shoot or cause to be shot any Partridges from the fif-
