WHAT THE NAVY MEANS IN CAUSE OF IMPERIALISM

Clive Phillips-Wolley Makes Strong Appeal For Support of the Canadian Navy.

Capt. Clive Phillips-Wolley, who was introduced as "poet, sportsman, imperialist, ranchman, traveler and many other things," addressed the Empire Club yesterday on "The Navy and the Empire." He is a good speaker, and balances statistics and sentiment in satisfactory measure. His "Songs of Esau" is a notable volume and a guarantee of his literary quality. The attendance was much beyond the ordinary, and represented the British Empire League and the Canadian Defence League, several ladies being present from these bodies.

Capt. Phillips-Wolley will leave the city tomorrow for Montreal, but expects to return and organize a branch of the Navy League which has made such strides in the west. It is possible that a public meeting may be held to promote the movement.

In the west, said the captain, the spirit of commercialism was so rampant that everything has to be approached on a financial basis. In Toronto, which was the city of self-sacrifice, he appealed to them on imperial grounds. Toronto represented the U. E. Loyalists, and their history was one of sacrifice.

Britain's Part. He created the world, that Christ came to teach the world, and that Britain was created to spread those teachings throughout the world, and that she had done it. Britain had taught people everywhere to greater profit. Britain had profited, but the people she dealt with had profited tenfold.

The basis of the corporate existence of the empire was the British navy. As Canada was an integral part of the empire, the navy was the basis of her existence. If that which the Navy League stood for was swept away then the empire would go with it.

He congratulated them on having the largest slice of white man's land left on the globe, but he deplored the fact that they had two immense seaboard unprotected and a land frontier without defense. He recounted the wealth of the Dominion and its future, which the dreams of a poet could not imagine. But to enjoy this their profession must be not that they were Canadians, but that they were British. If they ever made war they should do it in the only way that should ever be made—to command peace.

C.N.R. BLAMED FOR THE FIRES IN MINNESOTA

Eight Prosecutions Pending Against Railway For Combustible Materials on Right of Way.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 26.—(Special.)—The Canadian Northern Railway is held responsible for the fire that destroyed Beaudette, in the report made by General Andrews, formerly commissioner, by George Chapin of St. Paul and Frank Curtis of Roosevelt.

The report says there is sufficient evidence to show that the fire was started by the railway on the Canadian side during the latter part of July. It worked south to the north branch of the Beaudette River, and north to Rainy River, covering about eight square miles. It burned up to the west side of the town of Beaudette, and lay smouldering until Oct. 2, when it was fanned by a terrific wind and led to disaster. About the same time a fire was set on the right-of-way just east of Wister Road River. This fire worked east three miles, and about two miles back on the Canadian side of the river, where it connected with the fire which was started on the Beaudette side of the river.

Eight prosecutions against the C. N. R. for allowing combustible material on the right-of-way are now pending in the district court of Beltrami County. The court is fighting the constitutionality of the law. If the state wins in these cases, the forestry department plans to bring an action against the C. N. R. for sixteen other fires, alleged to have been started since July.

The loss from recent fires is estimated by agents of the forestry commission at about five million dollars.
