

Official Referee P. H. Drayton handed out his award on the arbitration between the town and J. F. H. Ussher of Victoria-avenue. The extension of the parallel road to Victoria-avenue was outlined to pass thru almost the centre of Mr. Ussher's highly desirable residential property. The town offered this was refused, and the matter placed in the hands of arbitrators. In the award Mr. Ussher is given \$3300, or over three times the price offered, and the municipality is to be assessed with the costs of the arbitration.

YORK COUNTY COUNCIL. Reeve Henry Makes Strong Plea for Auto Owners.

The members of the York County Council spent a busy day yesterday in disposing of a number of matters that have been hanging fire more or less since the June session.

With respect to the entrance of the radial lines, they re-affirmed their desire for a closer affiliation between the rural and city systems, volcing their approval of some plan whereby the present antiquated system of change should be done away with.

In the afternoon they disposed of the Scarboro question, known as the Kirk, ham bridge, a structure erected by Scarboro Township at a cost of \$6200, and which is really in effect a county bridge and serving that purpose, tho not hitherto recognized as such. Reeve W. D. Annis and Deputy-reeve W. H. Paterson of Scarboro put up a big fight for \$1000 as a minimum grant—by the way, a reasonable request—but she other county members stood for a rider stipulating that, in event of the ling opened, Scarboro should pay back the money.
