

The C. P. R. has about one thousand men laying tracks and yards at Coquitlam, the municipality about one hundred men and twenty teams working on streets, and roads, and M. P. Cotton & Co., who have the contract for clearing streets, etc., have about two hundred men at work, and approximately three hundred men are working in the biulding trades building houses, hotels, etc.

Last week they opened at Coquitlam a roller skating rink and a moving picture theatre-six months ago there was nothing but a level piece of ground there, and even two months ago when these men you see in the picture went there there was practically nothing except a few shanties.
