Discussion of the bill covering the war appropriation amounting to \$500,000,000 was productive of the liveliest sitting of the present session.

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WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

The fighting kept up severely on the Lys battlefield yesterday, but the British repulsed the German attacks and the lines remained stationary from a point near Givency to a point south of Kemmel.

The object of the enemy in attacking the British southern flank between Givency and the River Lys is to widen his wedge so as to have a room for a further advance.

If the enemy should succeed in enlarging the wedge in the British line by shoving back a considerable distance the defence between Givency and the Lys, he could hope for the pushing of his lines forward to Hazebrouck and so interrupting the British communications with Ypres.

The enemy has also made two attempts against the Belgian army.
