PLAN OF ORGANIZATION ADOPTED OF SPORTS BRANCH REPATRIATION LEAGUE

The duties of a sports branch in cooperation with the central executive of the Citizens' Repatriation League means the carrying out of the scheme whereby games and recreation may be provided for all returned men and their families, and the following plan was adopted:

(a) That the returned men, thru their accredited representatives or individual, be placed in touch with the existing bodies governing sports, all of which will render every poss be assistance and cooperation towards the absorption of teams and individuals in the several banches of sport.

(b) That competitions during 1919 be permitted for returned men as provided for in the following resolution adopted by the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada in May, 1916 (1916). "All bona fide officers, N. C. O.'s and men enlisted for active service in the Canadian forces may compete in all military athletic events where the competition is confined to such officers, N. C. O.'s and men; and amateurs shall not lose their amateur standing by reason of competition therein." (It is believed that the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada will readily consent to this proposal).


