NEW YORK, May 23.—Henry Breck-
er, 21 years of age, of Manhattan, was
to-night arrested on suspicion that he
was the man who yesterday ravished
and murdered Amelia, the 15-year-old
daughter of William Staffeldt, a farm-
er of Elmhurst.
Breckker, according to the police, ad-

mitted, washing his hands at a pump
in the nearby yard of Mrs. Emily S.
Simmons.

The arrest was made on the Shell-
road, near the Staffeldt home, and the
prisoner later was locked up.

IN TOKIO NEXT

National Sunday School Convention
Hold Their Final Rally.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable).
LONDON, May 23.—At Rome over
1000 members of the Sunday School
Convention, including 60 from Canada,
attended a final gathering at the Coli-
seum. Reference was made to the sig-
nificance of such an assembly in Rome
and a message of good-will from Pres-
ident Roosevelt was read. The next
convention will probably be at Tokio
in 1910.

sion Bishop Fallon will hold an ordi-
nation service.

Strike Practically Ended.
BUFFALO, May 23.—The strike of
inside freight handlers at the docks
was practically ended to-night, when
the Western Transit Co. conceded the
men an advance of three cents an hour
to the 20-cent scale for which the men
struck. Over 700 of the 1200 strikers
came from the Western Transit sheds
and it was said that the other com-
panies involved would meet the ad-
vance.

Whiskey Prices Go Up.
CINCINNATI, O., May 23.—The first
advance in a year in bulk whiskey was
made here to-day. It is two cents a
gallon, from \$1.29 to \$1.31 per gallon.
The prevailing price of corn is given
as the cause of the advance. Both in-
dependent and trust distillers will de-
mand the advance in accordance with
an agreement made when the whiskey
war was compromised two years ago.

**TYPOS WILL RATIFY
AGREEMENT IN WEEK**

Scale Committee Awaits Reply of
President Lynch—Binders and
Pressmen Satisfied.

While Typographical Union No. 91
as a body are still opposed to the sign-
ing of a five-year agreement, it is the
belief of a number of prominent mem-
bers of the organization that the new
agreement, as signed by International
Vice-President Hayes, on Wednesday,
will be ratified without change within
a week.
The scale committee held a special
meeting last evening and decided to
await the reply of International Pres-
ident Lynch, who is attending the ex-
ecutive meeting in Philadelphia to-day.
It is rumored that the executive
council, composed of President Lynch,
J. W. Beaumont and Hugo Miller, were
summoned to the city last night and
will respond as soon as the trifling
difficulty at Philadelphia is cleared up.
Mr. Hayes will also likely return to be
present at the conference.

"There will be no trouble," said a
prominent union man last night. "The
types were never known to turn down
an agreement once entered into. Only
last week the executive persuaded three
unions to stand by agreements in Amer-
ican cities, and all three provided for
much worse conditions than the local
branch will be subject to."
Another significant fact which will
certainly bear weight with the types
is that the pressmen and bookbinders,
at a special meeting last night, ratified
the clauses affecting them to the letter.
The bookbinders issued the following
official statement last night:

"The members are aware that at the
present time we are in receipt of a
scale of wages nominally \$15 for a 54-
hour week. We have always worked 52

hours, and were paid accordingly. Now
we are to get a further reduction of
four hours per week; but will receive
the full scale of \$15.

"We formerly received a rate of
27 2-3 cents per hour. We are now
to receive 34 1-4 cents per hour, and a
rate of 44 1-2 cents for overtime, making
a scale of \$19.82 for the present number
of hours worked.
"The increase to the employers is
\$4.82 per man for each 52 hours work-
ing."

RESCUED JUST IN TIME.

Two American Fishermen Picked Up
at Sea.

HALIFAX, May 23.—(Special.)—The
cable steamer MacKay Bennett, which
arrived here to-day, had on board two
American fishermen named Langry and
Olson, whom she picked up this morn-
ing 28 miles off Whitehead.
The men belonged to the American
fishing schooner Flora S. Nickerson,
and had been adrift in an open boat
for three days and nights without food
or water.
Straying from their vessel in a dense
fog 50 miles south of Sable Island, they
had rowed 150 miles and were within
28 miles of land when rescued in an
exhausted condition.
