THE CHANCE OF A LIFETIME.
A change of Government will not be altogether without its advantages. If Mr. Laurier is successful to-morrow a splendid opportunity will be opened for many a sharp business man to open his condition. Although our workmen are to be closed up and the factories thrown out of employment it will at least be a field day for the so-called "agent." Hundreds of agents will find lucrative occupation in handling the American-made goods that are to come into the country and take the place of the Canadian-made articles that are now supplying the demands of the people. In the event of Laurier coming into power, which, however, we do not anticipate, we advise our friends to make the best of the situation. Let them proceed at once to New York and Chicago and make arrangements with the manufacturers to handle the goods of the latter in Canada. The man who will secure the Toronto agency of the Armour packing company is a fortune. Hundreds of local butchers may have to put up their shutters, but Armour's agent will have a snap. We advise our friends the commercial travelers to make an early visit to the American trade centres and secure contracts with the best manufacturers. Our whole-sale houses may be obliged to go out of business, but the travelers of the American houses in Canada will make big salaries. They may have to leave Toronto and take up their residence in New York and Chicago.

The increased cost of living in this country is not only a profitable agency established in connection with the manufacturers of the United States, but Great Britain will prove an equally profitable field. The English tweed and cotton manufacturers will all require special agents in this country. The individual who is the first to put himself in communication with the British manufacturing firms is the one who is likely to secure the Canadian agency for them. Under the Laurier fiscal policy New York will become the commercial metropolis of Canada. Toronto will lose her factories, her wholesale houses, her capitalists. Toronto will dwindle down to a city of 75,000 inhabitants. The mansions that have been erected all over the city by Toronto's manufacturers and business men will soon be vacated and fall into the hands of the representatives of foreign firms. It is all waste that shows nobody good.

LAURIER'S FISCAL POLICY EXPOSED.
What effect will Mr. Laurier's fiscal policy have upon the country? We say it will shut up our factories and close our mines and furnaces. We say it will throw tens of thousands of workmen out of employment. It will drive the wholesale trade from Toronto and Montreal to New York. This is our opinion and that of the Conservative party generally of what will happen if Laurier's fiscal policy is adopted.

What is Mr. Laurier's own opinion of the effect of his policy upon Canadian industries? He expresses a "myopic, uncertain, indefinite hope" that if they get into power no harm will be done to Canadian manufacturers. "It is after this fashion that Mr. Edward Gurney, at the West Toronto meeting Saturday night, summarized the reasons given by the Liberal leaders in favor of their tariff policy. The Liberals, in fact, are now excusing themselves for tampering with the tariff. They say "no harm will be done." The Liberals have been fairly cornered on their tariff policy. While the election was being held, their newspapers and leading traders at length over the virtues of free trade, unrestricted reciprocity and the like, but now that the discussion has assumed a thoroughly practical turn they turn themselves to a minority. Instead of praising their tariff policy as formerly, they are content with excusing it. It will do no harm. Such is the miserable ending of the twenty years' free trade liberalism of the Liberal party. On the eve of election day, Mr. Laurier and his lieutenants desert their tariff policy. They do not ask electors to believe in it. They merely ask them to tolerate it.

The Liberal party's school plank is no less rotten than their fiscal policy. The "demon of indefiniteness" pursues Laurier even more fiercely on this question than on that of the tariff. No one knows how Laurier will handle the Manitoba question if he is returned to power. And yet the people are extremely anxious to have this vexatious problem settled one way or the other, and immediately. Laurier's policy affords them no satisfaction. True it is, the Conservatives are divided on this issue, but still the question will be settled by the Conservative party.

The past six weeks' campaigning has had the effect of emphasizing the fact that the Liberals have no definite, aggressive policy. The electors have come to realize this fact. The Conservative party will be sustained in 1896, as it was in the preceding general elections.

A CONTRAST OF POLICIES.
While the Liberal party has been persistently advocating the establishment of closer commercial relations, and even commercial union with the United States, during the past ten years, the Conservative party has as persistently done everything possible to secure some kind of preferential trade relations with Great Britain. The Liberals have signally failed in their policy, while the Conservative party is just on the eve of witnessing the realization of the Imperial tariff system, in which the present Premier has so long and so ably advocated. Mr. E.B.

Osler has just returned from London, where he has been present at a Toronto delegate at the Imperial Trade Convention, and he reports that a solution, consisting of the different sections of the Empire, is one of the certain future. The British people have more faith in Canada than in any of the other colonies. Mr. Osler predicts that large sums of money will be sent to this country to develop our mines and natural resources. He himself was offered \$700,000 by two syndicates to invest in British Columbia mines. The capitalists of Great Britain have had a bitter experience in connection with their investments in the United States. The Venezuela episode has made them apprehensive of the safety of their securities in that country. British capitalists will have little to do with Canada if the latter continues to discuss the possibility of a commercial union with the United States. The success of Laurier would convey the impression to the British capitalist that commercial union with the United States is an immediate possibility. Such an impression is needless to say, would have a very prejudicial effect on this country. The present is a period of unusual importance to Canada. British Columbia is on the eve of developing into a great South African. Our dream of an Imperial trade federation is about to be realized.

Why should we decide upon a policy that will jeopardize our advancement on these lines? Why should we not support the party that originated the preferential trade scheme? Why should we support the party that has not only opposed the idea of closer relations with Great Britain, but openly advocated the doctrine of commercial union with the United States? The Conservative party deserves to be supported because of its fidelity to the Mother Country.

The Liberal party richly merits defeat, because of its advocacy of a disloyal and unpatriotic alliance with the United States.

WARNING TO FARMERS.
The fate of Charles Chamberlain, erstwhile of Toronto, ought to be pondered over by all would-be farmers. The law under which Chamberlain was sentenced to three years' imprisonment in Manitoba applies to Ontario as well as the Prairie Provinces. Toronto is the scene of a lawless and lawless as an every-day police court offence, punishable by a \$10 fine or a few days in jail. It would be well for the would-be farmer to realize the fact that the crime is a serious one and will be so regarded by Canadian judges and juries.

THE WAGE-EARNER'S ELECTION.
In over there was an election in which the wage-earner is vitally interested. It is the present one. Liberal speakers unfairly speak of the National Policy as specially bolstering up a few manufacturers, when really the country has been made to hum, from Halifax to the Pacific with hundreds of industries. Our fisheries, shipping, lumbering and great farming industries have likewise been equally protected with the manufacturer. Why, then, should the latter be singled out as monopolists? The Government provides labor for the people. It is the kind of Government which the wage-earner wants. The men who by thousands must be out of work the coming winter in Toronto and other places in Canada, if the Liberals come into power, cannot afford to be blinded by false issues with such a prospect awaiting them the coming winter. Soup kitchens all over the land the coming winter will be poor consolation to wage-earners who want cheaper goods. Theories are often far from being practical. What the wage-earner wants is work, work, work.

POOR TACTICS.
Friends of Mr. Lount are distributing flysheet copies of Mr. Cockburn's bill of expenses while Canadian Commissioner to Chicago. In doing this they are injuring Mr. Lount more than they are hurting Mr. Cockburn. The electors want something more substantial than charges of this kind. They would sooner know how Mr. Lount stands on the tariff issue. As a matter of fact, Mr. Cockburn got nothing for his services and spent a lot of his own money in maintaining the dignity of the office entrusted to him.

ST. JAMES' CATHEDRAL.
Feeling Pulpit Reference to the Late Ex-Liberal Governor.

Canon DuMoulin, preaching yesterday at St. James' Cathedral, in a few words at the close of his sermon referred to the awfully sudden death of John Beverley Robinson, the preacher said: "Within the last few hours has passed among us one that his name was as a household word. He honorably served his birthplace and his country, yet, with awful suddenness, from the busy and exciting scenes of the present, he was summoned to his God."

The reverend gentleman spoke with great emotion and deep feeling. The subject of his remarks had been a member of St. James' congregation for a great number of years. Canon DuMoulin made no reference whatever to his approaching departure from St. James'. He will not, it is understood, sever his connection entirely with the parish until September.
