**WAS WRECKED YESTERDAY**  
**A Front-Street Factory Was Wrecked Yesterday**  
**BY A BOILER EXPLOSION.**

Several Employees in the Building Had a Miraculous Escape.

Three Men Were Badly Injured at Half Past Eight O'Clock. When the Disaster Occurred the Walls Were Blown Out, and it Took the Fire Brigade an Hour to Quench the Flames—Patonerson Manufacturing Company's Loss Covered by Insurance.

At 8:30 yesterday morning the buildings at 297-301 Front-street east were wrecked by a terrific explosion. Three men were injured. Their names are: Joseph Lancaster, 100 Spadina-street, and Robert Charlton, 13 Bright-street. Lancaster was taken home, and the other two to the General Hospital.

**GAS ACCUMULATED.**  
 The wrecked premises were occupied by the Paterson Manufacturing Co. for the manufacture of building papers and roofing material. The explosion shook the building in its foundations, and the roof fell in, windows smashed and people knocked down by the shock. The front door was supposed to have been caused by the apparatus which is used for converting the gas into water. It is supposed that the gas had accumulated in the room, and that the explosion was the cause of the explosion.

**THE INJURED EMPLOYEES.**  
 There were five of the employees in the factory at the time. Besides the three injured men here, two others were hurt, one of whom, Joseph Lancaster, was badly burned about the face and hands.
