

THE FOLLOWING OPEN LETTER HAS BEEN FORWARDED TO The World for publication on behalf of the Municipal Committee of The Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, thanking this paper for the firm position it has taken on the appointment of the Assessment Commissioner in the interests of the taxpayer. It is addressed openly to the members of the City Council:

To the Aldermen of the City of Toronto:

GENTLEMEN, -- We desire, as a large portion of the taxpaying community, to protest against the proposal that is being made of appointing the Mayor as Assessment Commissioner at a salary of \$4300 per annum.
