DESIGNED FROM COMMITTEE Aid. Hodgson Does So in View of His Connection With Junction Stock Yards.

GATTLE MARKET TO BE REMODELLED Various, Crying Needs Looked Into Yesterday Morning Early, and Practical Recommendations Expected.

Seven o'clock in the morning is an unusual hour for a civic committee to meet, but at the call of Ald. Sheppard a sub-committee of the Property Committee of the City Council met at that hour.

The committee consisted of Ald. Sheppard, Oat, Woods, Urquhart, Foster, Burns, Richardson and Hodgson. Ald. Frazer and H. B. Bayard were also present.

Ald. Hodgson declared to set upon the committee in view of his connection with the new stockyards at the Junction, but he was willing to furnish any information the committee desired.

There is a possibility that the market will be entirely remodelled in the locality it now occupies, with certain alterations and the addition of about 100 stalls in addition to the existing 50 stalls at the market.

It is proposed to take up the market for the next 1000 feet, and to construct a new building, as well as an alleyway 40 feet wide over the present low-lying portion of the market.

The new building, which will extend along the whole 300 feet of the Grand Trunk siding, in order to conform with the general arrangement of land owned by the city, but leased by Mr. Miller.

The weight scales will be taken up from the present location to the other end of the market and near to the railway.

Twenty Persons are Lost. Eleven Have Been Found and Identified, But Nine More are Missing.

AFTERMATH OF STEAMER EXPLOSION Disaster Was Due to the Captain's Desire to Make Up for Lost Time.

Philadelphia, Aug. 29.—Eleven known dead, nine missing and thirty-two injured is the record made by the explosion of the Trenton on the Delaware River yesterday afternoon. All along the city of Trenton, employees of the Wilmington Steamboat Company, which owned the boat, worked in and around the burned and blackened hull, searching for bodies of victims. Hundreds of men are dragging the river bottom with grappling irons to-day, and they are expected to continue to do so until every person is accounted for.

Of the eleven bodies that have been recovered, ten have been identified. The identified dead are: John P. Chew of Camden, N.J., assistant engineer of the City of Trenton; Miss Elizabeth Green, Philadelphia; William Dean, Philadelphia, a passenger; Arthur Lausung, 14 years old, Trenton, N. J.; James O'Connell, 6 years old, Trenton; Miss Mable, 6 years old, Philadelphia; August Mable, 6 years old, Philadelphia; William H. Keen, Philadelphia, passenger; James McCormick, Philadelphia, a passenger; William Nelson, 69 years old, Hampton, Va.

The unidentified body is so badly burned that its sex cannot be determined. Among the missing are Miss Ethel Stokes, Trenton, who was last seen in the boat; the stewardess, Miss Helen Bell, Trenton; the steward, Mr. John A. Brewster, Trenton; and the deck hand, Mr. William H. Keen, Philadelphia. According to the statements of the witness, the man had a presentation of the Trenton to the Trenton Hotel, Trenton, Pa. The Trenton was 115 feet long and 28 feet wide. It was carrying 1000 passengers and 100 tons of cargo. The boat was struck by a tugboat, which caused it to list and eventually to sink. The explosion occurred at 10:30 p.m. on August 28th.

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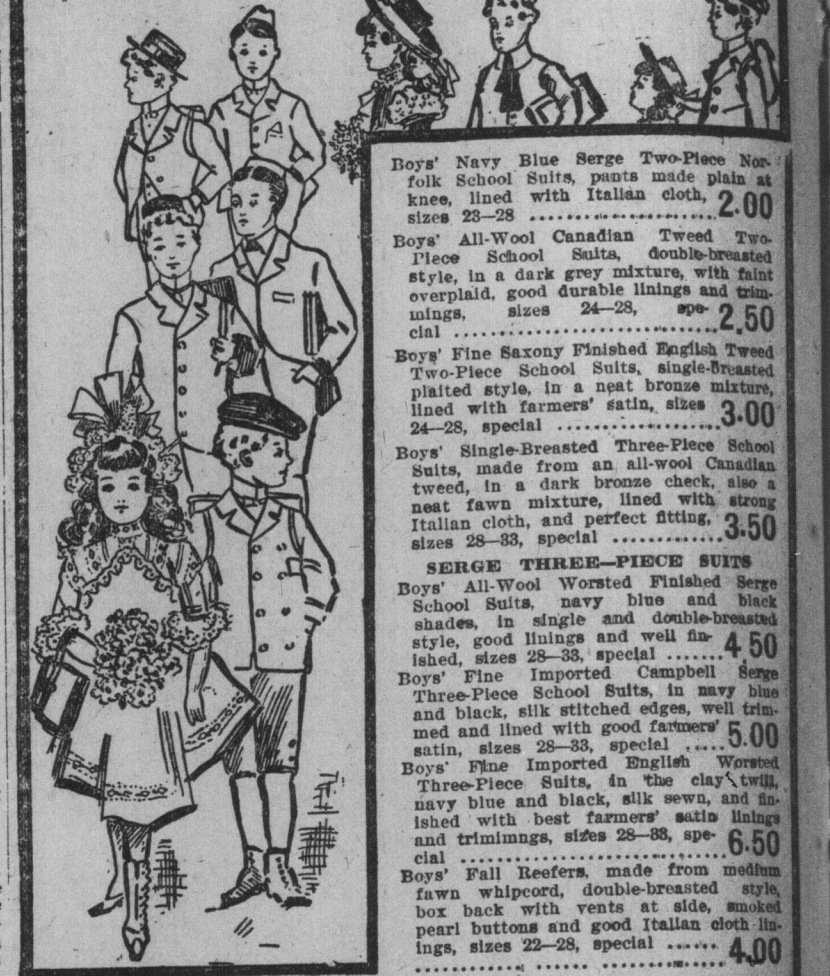
