The Artillery.

Annual Meeting of the Canadian Association. tion Last Night.

Lord Aberdeen and Minister Borden Among the Speakers-Interchange of Troops With the Mother Country.

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—The annual general meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association was held yesterday in the railway committee room of the House of Commons. The president, Lieut.-Col. Cole, occupied the chair, and the attendance was large. The association voted down a proposition to change its name. The report of council, which was adopted, contains the following: "The council earnestly recommends that in view of the increase of the establishments of field batteries and change in armament, the allowance for drill instruction and caretaking be revised and increased."

Lieut.-Col. Irwin announced that the programme for the competition between the British and Canadian artillery men was completed. The programme has already peen published. Lord Aberdeen spoke briefly in reply to a vote of thanks for his contribution to the association. He commended the association for the excellent work during the year.

Dr. Borden, minister of militia, spoke in reply to a vote of thanks. He said that besides an additional grant of \$2,-100 to the association, the government would defray the cost of the visiting British team. As to the weapon used by the artillery, none was too good. While in England recently he found the greatest interest taken in Canadian military affairs. This was partly due to the splendid shooting done by Canadians both at home and abroad. At the suggestion of Gen. Montgomery Moore it had been arranged that an interchange should be made between a company of Canadian corps and the Berkshire regiment at Halifax. The interchange would continue right along. Next spring a battery of Canadian artillery would interchange with one from the Royal Artillery. These changes would be of immense value in the future if Canadians would have to fight alongside British. Though there was no danger of war at the present time, the Canadian people would be wise to prepare for an emergency, and the government intended to take such steps that in the event of any disturbance, Canada, with the assistance of the imperial troops, might present a most formidable front to the

Gen. Gascoigne said that six batteries of six breech-loading 12-pounder field artillery guns had already been provided, and a requisition for arms for four additional batteries had been When the rearming of the field artillery is completed, Canada would have 60 artillery guns of the most approved pattern. The ammunition factory at Quebec was being fitted up with machinery to provide shells for the artillery. The whole artillery force would be supplied with the most modern equipment. The delay in delivering the big guns was at the suggestion of the imperial authorities, so that the best weapon might be had. The Quebec factory would be provided with machinery to turn out 12-pound shells. Lieut.-Col. Cole was re-elected president, and Major Donaldson, secretary, and at a meeting of the council, Lieut.-Col. Irwin was elected chairman.


