

AGED WOMAN IS BEATEN TO DEATH

Mrs. Cornelia Welch of Detroit
Supposed To Have Been
Killed for Money.

Detroit, Jan. 8.—Bound hand and foot, with several ugly bruises on her head and face, Mrs. Cornelia Welch, aged about 65, was found dead in a room in her apartment over 78 Congress street east at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The scene of the slaying is almost under the tower of the county building and only one block from police headquarters.

That the crime was committed for money is the theory of the police. Several suspects were quickly gathered in, one of whom, Dan Scott, aged 32, was "swabbed" for two hours. Scott, it is claimed, was on friendly terms with the dead woman.

Patrolmen Devereaux and Dingeman went to the apartments and found all the back doors unlocked. Mrs. Welch's bedroom was locked and they forced it open, bringing them face to face with the ghastly sight.

The body of Mrs. Welch lay on the floor, the face, with horrifying expression, turned upwards. The hands were tightly bound with an apron, which had been wound into rope shape. The feet were held by straps, but not so tightly. The woman's head rested on a blood-soaked pillow.

Evidence of a struggle was plenty. The bedclothes and other articles were strewn about the room and a chair had been tossed on the bed, probably to make room to lay the body on the floor.

On one of the bed posts Mrs. Welch's handbag was hanging. It contained only nine or ten pennies. Her gold watch was found on the floor.

The police took possession of the house and Coroner Parker ordered the body sent to the county morgue. Before the body was removed a morbid crowd of hundreds gathered outside and the police had their hands full in keeping them within bounds. Even the street cars had trouble making a passage through Congress street.

CURES MENINGITIS

New Remedy Discovered by Dr. Flexner Proves Its Worth.

Baltimore, Jan. 7.—In a new cerebro-spinal meningitis case brought to the attention of Johns Hopkins Hospital from Atlanta, the doctors in charge have again used with success the serum which Dr. Simon Flexner, head of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, New York, recently discovered. The patient, Irving Hall, is a young man. Before being brought to the hospital the disease had run its normal five weeks and showed all the malignant symptoms which develop, such as high temperature, rapid pulse and rigidity of muscles. The success of the trial of the serum is regarded here as a noteworthy tribute to the value of Dr. Flexner's discovery, which has been thought by some of the profession to aid only in incipient cases. The patient is now out of danger.

Interesting Sketch of London Hunt The Ideal County Club of Ontario

Local Lady Writes of the Origin
of the Present Institution.

Miss Isabel C. Armstrong, of Maltland street, city, has a very interesting article in the December Outdoor Canada, on the subject of the London Hunt Club.

The article is entitled "The Most Picturesque Country Club in Ontario," and it makes good reading. Miss Armstrong says:

"Away out on Richmond street, beyond the bridge that crosses the north branch of the Thames, stands 'Glenmore,' the home of the London Hunt Club, which has the proud distinction of being one of the most picturesque country clubs in Canada.

Houses have a funny habit of talking on the characteristics of their tenants. 'Glenmore' is no exception to the rule. The quaint, old-fashioned house at the very first glance suggests solidly comfort and hospitality. On one side is an old orchard, which could breathe many tales of merry romps. Rather grim it is at this season of the year, but rarely beautiful in blossom time. The approach is by a range of fir trees and lilacs, the latter a mass of fragrant bloom in spring-time. Two excellent tennis courts on either side of the avenue were seldom idle during the past summer, and in September were the scene of the second annual tournament.

From the broad verandas of the club-house a glimpse is afforded of undulating meadows and shady woods. Indeed, from the veranda can be seen much of the playing on the golf links, which is in itself a decided advantage to spectators, who can watch contests in comfort.

It was in the autumn of 1885, immediately after the close of the rebellion in the Northwest, that the London Hunt Club was formed. But it was by no means as pretentious an organization then as now. The veterans had returned home, and some of them doubtless wanted to work off their surplus energy. However, that may be, the late John Fulcher, at that time riding master at the Hellmuth Ladies' College, had excellent horses adapted for hunting. He was enthusiastic over the sport, and suggested the forming of a hunt club. His enthusiasm was contagious, and in September a business meeting was called for the election of officers, followed immediately after by the first run with the hounds.

The original members were the late Col. John Peters, first master; Dr. Niven, the late Harry Becher, Col. A. M. Smith, W. T. Strong, Col. Dayson, Robert Wallace, the late John Fulcher, and the late David Skirving.

A lowly, disused pig pen on Oak street housed the four original hounds, and the meets took place in the east end of the city at the old race track. It was not until two years later that the social element was added, and a small club-house secured north of the 'Glenmore,' the Hunt Club, or the 'Kennels,' as it is familiarly called, became the center of much of the social life of the city, and it was soon found necessary to remove to more commodious quarters.

Other sports have been added from time to time, but hunting with hounds is still the primary object of the club. During the autumn season meets are held at least once or twice a week, several members of the fair sex entering with zest into the chase.

A FIGHT FOR A NAME

The Right to Use Salvation Army Being Argued in the Courts.

New York, Jan. 7.—The question whether the Salvation Army, of which General William Booth is the head, has the exclusive right to use that name in the United States was argued in the supreme court today. The arguments were on an application to have made permanent a temporary injunction restraining the American Salvation Army from longer using that name.

General James William Ruffy, of the head of the American Salvation Army, alleges that he was forced to leave Brooklyn last summer as a result of threats made by District Attorney Clarke after he had been arrested on a charge of vagrancy and discharged in the magistrate's court. He is at present at the headquarters of his organization in Philadelphia.

Former Justice of the Peace Serrick appeared for the Salvation Army of the United States, which General Wm. Booth is the commander.

"The practices of this defendant organization in Brooklyn," said Justice Herick, "were such as not only to bring discredit upon themselves, but also upon the name."

Wilson Lee Cannon, counsel for the defendants, argued that his organization had a right to the name it uses. "We were incorporated under that name in Dauphin County, Philadelphia, and later in the county of Philadelphia," said he. "We have spread throughout twelve or more states and we have 65 posts with 175 officers."

At the conclusion of the arguments counsel were instructed to hand up papers on Friday.

Since then the club has had five presidents, the late Mrs. John Labatt, Miss Carlisle, Mrs. Robert Piddimble, Mrs. Ernest Smith, and Mrs. Niven, who was president this year upon the retirement of Mrs. Smith.

Last year was one of the most enthusiastic and successful in the history of the Ladies' Club. BIG DIAMOND FIRMS SUSPEND

The Sales in Gems Undergo an
Unprecedented Decline—Con-
cerns Hope To Resume.

New York, Jan. 8.—Four of the biggest diamond houses on Fifth avenue suspended yesterday, announcing liabilities of \$4,500,000. The firms are Joseph Frankel's Sons, Joseph Frankel's Sons Company, H. M. Gattie & Co. and Gattie, Ettinger & Hummel.

The liquidating trustees, in whose hands the affairs of the concerns have been placed, declare that the suspension is only temporary, and that all of the firms are solvent, having assets of \$6,500,000.

The fact that some reputedly wealthy customers of the firms have been slow in paying their bills contributed to the suspensions.

The business relations of the suspended corporations are closely interwoven. The first three named have establishments at No. 576 Fifth avenue, where they have been famous for years as importers of gems of the highest class for the wealthiest Americans. It was Simon Frankel, of Frankel's Sons Company, who brought the famous Hope diamond to America, and some of the most famous jewels now in this country were purchased through one of the four firms.

But according to the statement made last night by William Nelson Cromwell (counsel for the liquidating trustees) their sales in gems had undergone recently an unprecedented decline. Hence, Mr. Cromwell said, it had been decided to suspend business in order that more time might be taken to realize fully upon the assets, and thus save creditors any loss.

The liquidating trustees are James C. Cannon, banker; Louis Kahn, of L. Kahn & Co., diamond merchants, and John M. Van Cleef, vice-president of the National Park Bank. They have taken over the affairs of the concerns, with the stipulation that liquidation shall be complete within 18 months.

The Frankel Sons Company was organized in 1903 with a capital of \$1,000,000. Until recently it is said their business has averaged \$2,500,000 a year. It is announced that the Messrs. Frankel and Gattie have also turned over \$400,000 worth of real estate personally owned by them, to facilitate the payment of their creditors.

ROOSEVELT'S FINANCE BILL

It Provides for Banks' Use of
Bonds Other Than Those
of Government.

Washington, Jan. 7.—The financial bill which has for some time been in preparation by leading Republican members of the Senate committee on finance, was today printed and given to the public.

The bill provides for an additional issue of bank circulation, which shall not exceed 25 per cent. upon bonds other than those issued by the Government, including state and municipal bonds in approved cases.

The comptroller of the currency is given discretion in the issuance of the proposed currency and is authorized to decide as to the time and the amount to be awarded to any banking institution.

It is provided that the increased circulation shall in no case exceed 75 per cent. of the value of the bonds deposited.

Senator Aldrich introduced the bill to the Senate today. The measure provides for national banking association which has circulating notes outstanding, secured by the deposit of United States bonds to an amount of not less than 50 per cent. of its capital, and which has a surplus of not less than 20 per cent. may make application to the comptroller of the currency for authority to issue additional circulating notes to be secured by the deposit of bonds other than United States bonds.

ALFONSO A ROYAL HUSTLER

KING OF SPAIN RUBBED ELBOWS
WITH THE MAN IN THE
STREET IN LONDON.

"Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown" does not apply to King Alfonso of Spain. Surely the cares of a crown never weighed less heavily upon the brow of any sovereign.

Attempt upon his life may occasionally cause him anxious reflection, but his buoyant spirits and contempt for danger prevent such moods from lasting. His lack of fear usually shows itself in a desire to escape the vigilance of those responsible for his personal safety.

To seek adventures unguarded and alone, save perhaps for a single comrade, is one of the pleasures of his life, and his escapades in this direction, although they have given many anxious moments to his friends in Madrid, have made him idolized by his people. During his recent stay in England he found the restrictions on his movements removed to some extent, and he eagerly seized the opportunity of enjoying himself in the way he chose.

Coming from a country where procrastination is the besetting evil, and "Manana" the national watchword, one would expect to find King Alfonso to set the pace here in output of energy, but he did it so thoroughly that he had bestowed upon him the title of royal hustler.

Mass in the morning, followed by golf, shooting, visits to friends, shopping excursions, strolls through the streets and in the parks, dashing from one sight to another in an automobile, luncheon with this royalty, dinner with that, and the theater in the evening—such were his days in London.

The King went about among the people with the utmost freedom. It seemed to be one of his chief delights to forget his royal station and rub shoulders with the man in the street, to be jostled by him and to jostle him back.

One Sunday morning he slipped quietly out of the palace and mingled with the crowd which was waiting outside the gates to see him drive to mass. On another occasion, in order to escape stagnation, he jumped into a passing motor cab, went to Olympia and paid his shilling like an ordinary visitor to see the auto show.

A few days later he found himself threatened with a few unoccupied moments, so he went to Mme. Tussaud's waxwork show and paid his entrance money. While he was inspecting with curiosity his own wax effigy his identity was discovered by an observant old lady.

Beside King Alfonso's model there was one of Queen Victoria of Spain. The old lady remarked upon the incompleteness of the group.

"What a pity the baby isn't in it," she said out loud, whereupon the King, who was standing next to her, broke out into a merry laugh. The elderly lady looked up.

"Good gracious, it's the King himself!" she exclaimed, and then made a hasty retreat in order to hide her confusion.

One another occasion the King, accom-

panied by the Duke of Alba, paid a surprise visit to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Help Society. He wore a "bowler" hat and turned up the collar of his black overcoat so that it half covered his face. Thinking that he had thus sufficiently disguised himself, he entered the front shop, but he was immediately recognized.

One of the King's many adventures in London was undertaken for the purpose of seeing the Eubens picture of the Saviour, now in the possession of H. Roche at his house in Brompton Square. When two gentlemen were announced Mr. Roche asked for their names, but received an evasive reply. After a time it dawned upon him that the younger of the two was the King of Spain.

"You are the King of Spain?" he asked the stranger, who smilingly replied, "We are very much alike, and people very often take me for him." He then burst out laughing, and made a clean breast of it.

Before returning to Spain the King was anxious to have the experience of traveling in one of London's underground electric railways. On the morning of his last day in London, therefore, he walked down Piccadilly to Charing Cross, accompanied by the Duke of Alba.
