"Sir,—Your extraordinary letter of yesterday, and the still more extraordinary resolution which accompanies it, detailing, without apparent shame, the scandalous proceedings of yourself and your associates around the church and presbytery of Our Lady of the Lake, Ford City, on the 22nd inst., reaches me on the eve of my departure from London, to meet an engagement long since arranged. Fortunately, however, the subject of your communication lends subject of your communication lends subject of your communication lends itself easily to an immediate, definite and final reply, and, as the news of your indefensible and uncatholic action came to me through the columns of the daily press before I was favored with your letter, you will not find it amiss that I should make use of the same valuable avenue of publicity to set forth some fundamental facts and truths that have been publicly flouted.


