-Declare Present Plan Is Too Indefinite.

Luxury taxation, as at present instituted, was condemned as unwieldly and inefficient by London retail merchants at a meeting in the Tecumseh House Friday afternoon. They unanimously favored a general percentage tax on all retail turnover in its place. This, at even 2 per cent, would yield a larger revenue, they claimed.

Word to this effect was forwarded to members of parliament representing London and Western Ontario constituencies, and also to Western Ontario boards of trade.

The meeting was called by James Gray, chairman of the retail committee of the Chamber of Commerce, and was well attended by representatives of furniture, drygoods, clothing and hardware merchants, shoe dealers and furriers.

The general feeling of the meeting was that the present taxes were so indefinite in their terms as to be capable of many interpretations. It was pointed out that many merchants in the same line of business were placing different meanings on sections of the tax applying to their lines.
