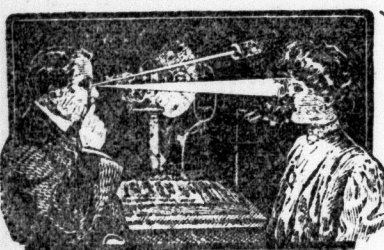

**TENDERS FOR EALING
SCHOOL TO BE TAKEN
BY COMMITTEE YET**

Through a Misunderstanding
None Are Received On Mon-
day—Some Clauses
Protested.

Through a misunderstanding of the
closing date no tenders were received
by the committee of the board of
education Monday afternoon for addi-
tions to Ealing school. The committee
will meet again today to open any
tenders which may be received by that
time.

Exchange complaining about some of
the provisions of the board's form of
contract was dealt with. Objection was
taken to the requirement for a marked
check, and it was decided to remove
this as such action had actually
been agreed upon at a previous meet-
ing. None of the other clauses were
changed. Another clause against which
protest was made was that giving the
architect power to dismiss incompetent
employees. It was claimed that only
the contractor should have this power.
No change was made in this. Protest
was also made against specifying each
section of the work to be done in-
stead of submitting a bulk contract.
This also was not changed. Trustee
Mrs. Harris thought that the board
should know the cost of each part of
the work. Another provision, which
was protested was that requiring a
year's guarantee of the work. It was
thought that thirty days would be
enough. Chairman Hayman said that
no builder would make a guarantee
now for a longer period than that un-
less a big percentage was charged to
cover possible loss.

More Tenders.
Tenders for work on Wortley road
and Victoria schools will be called for
on Wednesday, to be in by July 15. At
Victoria school it is planned to add
four rooms to the present building. It
is estimated that the cost will be
somewhere in the neighborhood of \$65,000.
At Wortley road school six rooms
will be added, costing about \$65,000.
The Red Cross bungalow on Carling
Heights, which is to form the nucleus
of a new school to be located on the
east side of Oakes street, between
Oxford street and the Piccadilly street
line, will be moved immediately from
its present location. The board will be
asked to approve plans for adding two
more rooms to it and covering the

**FOUNDRYMEN HOLD
ORGANIZATION MEET**

Those Present in Favor of
Forming Union—Election
On Friday.

An organization meeting of the roll-
ing mills workers, tin workers, steel
workers, chain workers, nail workers,
bolt workers, spike workers, and
nut workers and pipe millers was
held at the club-room of the Army and
Navy Veterans last night.

About twenty men of the different
trades were present and at the close
of the meeting each one expressed his
willingness to aid in forming a union
in the city.

Ernest Curtis of Hamilton, or-
ganizer for Eastern Canada, was in
charge of the proceedings. He spoke
on the aims and value of a union in
the city, stating that the manufacturers
would recognize the union as men, and
receive their work as being done by
men, giving a fair day's wage for a
fair day's work. He read the rules of
the union and pointed out that the
object of the union was to benefit the
men and uplift their families. He went
back to the time when he was em-
ployed as a laborer, and recited the
hardships he went through. Since the
beginning of the year the membership
of the unions in Canada has increased
30 per cent, he said.

Several foreigners were present, and
interpreters for their benefit were pre-
sented and explained to them the object of
the union.

Max Lerner was one of the interpre-
ters. He gave a short address telling
of the conditions in Russia, of which
country he is a native.

A. Nideman was the other interpreter.
He made a short speech, boosting a
union of the men.

W. T. C. secretary of the Machinists'
Union in this city, was chairman. He
gave an address, stating that he in-
tended doing all in his power to make
the organization a success.

A meeting of the workers in the
various foundries, who are union men,
will be held on Friday night for the
purpose of the election of officers and
other important matters.

If the union is formed it will be the
78th union to be formed in the city
of London, which has a population of 60,000
to have as many unions.
