After the conquest of Po-land, permission would be given Russia to send a number of Bolshevik com-missioners into that country to control the export of Polish supplies of all kinds.

"Russia," the correspondent adds, "intends to try to avoid the terms of this treaty by the creation of a Polish Bolshevik army, the first steps in the formation of which are now being taken in occupied areas of Poland. "When Russia withdraws from Poland she will leave this Polish army, permitting Germany to take such steps as she can to face the situation. HAS BOLSHEVIK HORDES DRIVING ON SECRET PACT TOWARDS WARSAW; POLES MAKING STRONG STAND AGAINST INVADERS

Poland's Volunteer Army Reported To Have Retaken Town of Brody-Munitions and Rifles From France and Britain Are Being Rushed To Warsaw For That City's Final Stand Against Soviet Forces — French Officers Acting As Technical Advicers To Polish Commanders.

Polish Situation

The steady march of the Russians upon Warsaw has created a situa-tion which is causing grave anxiety in European capitals. Some expressions go even to the extent of com paring it with that of August, 1914. The Allies are making representa-tions to Soviet Russia in aid of Po-land, the British note dispatched yesterday being now described in some quarters as in the nature of an confirmed in authoritative quarters. The Russian emissaries now in Lon don are reported to have recognized the gravity of conditions and are urging their Government to halt the Russian march in Poland. Efforts by the armies of the Polish Republic to stem the tide of the Russian Bolshevik invasion which threatens Warsaw seem to have

Brest-Litovsk, the last bastion in the permanent defences east of the Polish capital, is in the hands of the soviet armies; and Lomza, an im portant railroad junction and strate-gic base to the northeast, and Kovel, northeast of Brest-Litovsk, have been given up by the Poles West of Brest-Litovsk the Poles still hold the great fortress that have made that city one of the principal fortresses of Eastern Europe. but soviet troops have been flung across the Bug River further to the northeast, and it would appear this move will compel a retirement of the Poles from their defences. The Russians are advancing in echelon after the tactics adopted by Gen. Mac-kensen when he led the German armies in the great Dunaje cam-paign during the war, and the Poles are repeatedly being outflanked and forced to leave positions they have held for days against frontal at-

Leaves for Minsk. The Polish armistice commission leaves Warsaw for Minsk today to meet representatives of the Moscow Government for the purpose of arranging an armistice and beginning peace negotiations.

There are many reports of Allied action to stop the advance of the Bolsheviki or to come to the aid of Poland, but as yet nothing authori-tative has been reported relative to this phase of the seemingly desperate situation confronted by the infant republic. The military situation relative to the Bolshevik and Polish armies continues somewhat obscure. A Berlin report received here would

seem to indicate soviet troops have reached a point about thirty miles from the outer fortifications of Warsaw. This report, however, has not been confirmed, and, in fact, disagrees with some other dispatches. While rumors persist in some quarters that the Polish position is desperate, it is said to be more favor-able in some well-informed circles, where it is even questioned whether the reds have actually captured Brest-Litovsk as claimed, or menace Warsaw in any way. warsaw in any way.

Warsaw, Aug 5.-Russian soviet armies driving against the Polish lines defending Warsaw are maintaining an average progress of six miles per day the direction of this city.
