Royal Family Supports Forthcoming Infants' Health Exhibition in London.

LONDON, April 19.—Several members of the royal family will give their patronage to the Infants' Health Exhibition, which is to be held in London the middle of June.

There has been much emotional literature written about the appalling high mortality in infants under 12 months old, and as the result of careful enquiries which have been proceeding for some months all over the kingdom...

Statistics of infant mortality afford a very important index to the serious conditions that affect the infant life, but by far the most serious matter affecting the commonwealth in every possible way is the condition of babies who do not die, but who are reared in a condition of hopeless malnutrition.

One of the chief objects of the exhibition will be to teach the people the pure and high ideal of motherhood. Eminent physicians are coming forward with evidence that there is an appalling number of children of the well-to-do class who are born healthy, but who within a few months of birth become desperately ill in consequence of the absence of food adapted to their precise requirements.

Improper feeding in infancy frequently induces convulsions, which often run into epilepsy. Epilepsy often ends in death.

At the forthcoming exhibition lectures will point out that it is not enough to say that mother's milk is the best food for an infant, but that it must be seen that the mother is able to supply efficient food. It is well-known that some of the worst cases of malnutrition in infants admitted to children's hospitals have been those infants entirely breast-fed.

Grain Elevator Burned. CHATHAM, Ont., April 18.—(Special.)—G. T. Crow's elevator at Prairie Sidling, with its contents, was burned to the ground to-day. The fire was first noticed when it had made such headway as to be beyond control. It is not known how the fire originated, unless it was from sparks from a passing railway train.
