This is, of course, dependent on the action of the public holders, who seem at the present time willing to hold for higher prices. The strike on a new section of the Nipissing property did not have any special influence on the stock, but it is believed that strong efforts will be made to prevent these shares from advancing at the present time. The close of the exchange was dull, with offerings quite small at the reaction.

Modern Millers' Winter wheat threshing is intermittent, owing to unsettled weather and frequent rain. In Nebraska heavy rain did some damage to wheat in the shock. Threshing returns show an irregular yield with many short crops. The southeast, which has been enjoying good average crops reports smaller in yield than farmers expected. The largest proportion of the wheat threshed is excellent in quality and heavy in weight. Most farmers are not disposed to sell.
