CANADIAN UNIONISTS STAY WITH FEDERATION

Delegate Jones Finds No Sympathy With Canada-Fer-Canadians Policy.

When President Gompers called the convention of the A. F. of L. yesterday morning, he announced that Delegate E. Russ of the Typographical Union, a resident of Niagara Falls, N. Y., had been appointed in his room the previous night, and he requested the delegates to stand silently for a brief period as a tribute to respect to the memory of their late colleague.

Delegate Jones, of Atlanta, Ga., who was present at the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress held in Quebec last September, delivered his report.

He said that as far as Canadian workers are concerned, their sympathy is entirely with the American Federation of Labor and the ideas for which that body stands. The policy "Canada for the Canadians" is as distasteful to the average Canadian unionist as an open shop policy is to his American brother. They are anxious to keep intact the brotherly bond that exists between Canadian unionists and those of the United States. They had the foresight to see that the union movement is not merely a local affair or one in which each country can work out for itself.

Referring to his impressions gained at the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress, he commented upon the fact that both French and English were used by the delegates, but that many were unable to speak both languages. It was demonstrated beyond doubt that their ideas were identical, and their loyalty to the international union movement was unquestionable.

He was confident that the Canadians were loyal subjects of Great Britain, and would have to be a very vital matter on which they would take up arms against another country. In conclusion, he paid a tribute to the late President Alphonse Verville, M.P.

Votes for Women.

Miss Potter of the University of Minnesota, representing the American women's suffrage movement, addressed the delegates. Following her introduction by President Sam Gompers, she at once changed into English, and stated that she became a convert to the suffrage movement a year ago in Chicago. She thought that the militant method practiced by English women would not be needed in America. She eulogized Mrs. Pankhurst, whom she met recently. She considered that the labor organization had proved the greatest educational influence for the last quarter of a century in America. She asked the convention to give the

GOMPERS CRITICIZED BY K. O. L.

For His Having Been in Contempt-Assembly Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The attitude of Samuel Gompers, the president of the American Federation of Labor, in his contempt proceedings, is characterized as a wilful, premeditated violation of the law by Simon Burns, General Master Workman of the General Assembly, Knights of Labor, in his annual report to the general assembly of his organization. It received the hearty approval of the delegates.

Compulsory arbitration in all labor disputes was heartily endorsed by the assembly, which endorsed the work of Terence V. Powderly, formerly master workman of the order, and now head of the information bureau of the department of commerce and labor. The course of the American Federation of Labor in advocating the abolition of this bureau was condemned.

Other resolutions approved the course of William Lusk, collector of the port of New York, in endeavoring to protect the government in the collection of revenue, and endorsed President Taft in his efforts to carry out the pledges of the platform of his party.

REVIVE DREYFUS AFFAIR IN THE STEINHEIL CASE

Thru Death of Ex-President Faure—State's Witnesses Favorable to the Prisoner.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—The testimony today in the trial of Mme. Steinheil, charged with the murder of her husband and her stepmother, was distinctly favorable to the defendant.

Marietta Wolf, the cook in the Steinheil household, and her son, Alexander, whose appearance was awaited with profound interest, throw no new light on the mystery, but by a further mass of contradictions strengthened the impression in the accused's favor.

It was after she had expressed the opinion that Adolphe Steinheil was ignorant of his wife's intrigues that the witness was confronted with the deposition which she made for the police soon after the tragedy. In this she had stated that when the accused had learned that her husband was dead, she ejaculated, "At last I am free."

"I have been misquoted," she said. "It was when the nurse had left me, alone that she cried out 'At last I am alone.' She added that the prisoner and always known herself very fond of both her husband and her stepmother.

During the examination of the cook Madame Steinheil displayed great coolness, frequently interrupting with passionate protests against the questions and the deductions made from the answers.

Case Breaking Down.

Mme. Steinheil's nurse also retracted her previous deposition, in which she expressed the opinion that the defendant's illness after the crime was simulated, and Maurice Berderel, a wealthy merchant, whom the state assumes she desired to marry, testified to his absolute belief in the innocence of the defendant.

The state's circumstantial case against Mme. Steinheil seems to be rapidly crumbling, and it is already rumored that the case has been abandoned on a new investigation order.
