### CHEESE MARKETS.

Alexandria, June 28.—At the cheese board meeting held here last night 990 boxes white cheddar were offered and all sold at 21c. Usual buyers.

Luttwal, June 28.—At the Dalrymple's Board today 200 white and 2100 colored cheeses were boarded. All sold at 21c.

Campbellville, June 29.—At the cheese board meeting held here last night 845 were offered. All sold at 21 3/4c.

Napanee, June 29.—At the cheese board meeting today 200 white and 2100 colored cheeses were boarded. All sold at 21 1/2c.

Chicago, June 29.—Both sellers and buyers held off in the wheat trade to some extent, but no action on the corn bill. Prices kept within narrow limits and closed at exactly the same as last night. The finish was 1 1/2c on September. The outcome in corn ran from 2c decline to 1/4c advance, and for the shade to 1/2c to 3/4c. The wheat suffered losses of 1c to 2 1/2c net.

At first wheat showed a leaning to bear side of the market, instances were or less by word that plans were formulated to ensure joint action on the part of the United States and Canadian exports and milling operations, as general marketing requirements. The United States and Canadian and Canadian supplies of low-grade wheat were large, and seemed to be prepared to meet the market, and in competition with corn as feed. The coming of values, nevertheless, took place, and the market continued to move as a result to some extent of the new domestic wheat was not apparent. The market was not moved.

Export activity put strength into July delivery of corn, but distant export were heavy, owing to optimistic crops.

Ons were easy on account of the valuable crop outlook.

Provisions lacked any aggressive port. Lower quotations on hogs encouraged buyers, and so, too, did the fact that demand was sluggish.
