Finance Commissioner's Report Calls for Economy in All Branches.

Firance Commissioner Ross laid before the board of control in private session yesterday a very pessimistic report on the city's financial situa-tion. It contained the statement that f the department estimates were not further reduced the city's tax rate this year would be 351/2 mills. After going into the matter with the treasurer, the board called in the heads of the departments and told them to shut down on expenditure. The board will go thru the estimates next Tuesday and will probably give them a considerable pruning.

"Proposals involving capital expen-diture total the almost appalling sum of \$4.400,000, and, in addition, the city will this year have to guarantee bonds of the harbor commission for \$4,000,000, and market them. "I think it well to point out that
